

ORDINANCE No. 82

An Ordinance Calling a General Municipal Election to Be Held in the City of Torrance on the 14th Day of April, 1924.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1
A general municipal election is hereby called to be held in the City of Torrance on the 14th day of April, 1924, for the purpose of electing four members of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, three of whom shall be elected for full term and one of whom shall be elected for a short term of two years.

Section 2
The polls for said election at the polling places hereinafter designated shall be opened at six o'clock in the morning of said day of election and shall be kept open continuously thereafter until seven o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, when said polls shall be closed and the election officers shall then proceed to canvass the ballots cast at said election.

Section 3
There shall be two voting precincts for the conduct of such election to be known and designated as follows: Consolidated Precinct No. 1, which shall consist of the whole of Torrance City Precincts No. 1 and No. 3, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles.

Consolidated Precinct No. 2, which shall consist of the whole of Torrance City Precinct No. 2 as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles.

Section 4
The polling places of said election are hereby fixed as follows:
For Consolidated Precinct No. 1, Torrance High School Auditorium.
For Consolidated Precinct No. 2, Garage at northeast corner Border Avenue and 213th Street.

Section 5
The election officers for said election shall be hereafter appointed as required by law and said election shall be conducted in the manner provided by law where not otherwise provided for in this Ordinance or in any subsequent ordinance of this Board of Trustees, and no sample ballots shall be mailed to the electors of said City.

Section 6
The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and the vote thereon and shall cause the same to be published twice in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper of general circulation, printed, published and circulated in said City of Torrance, which is hereby designated for said purpose, and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.

NOTICE OF FILING ASSESSMENT FOR THE WORK OF IMPROVEMENT OF PORTIONS OF MARTINA, MANUEL AND WATSON AVENUES AND 218TH STREET PROVIDED FOR BY RESOLUTION OF INTENTION NO. 147 PASSED NOVEMBER 6TH, 1923, AND OF THE TIME OF HEARING AS TO SAID WORK AND SAID ASSESSMENT.

The undersigned the City Clerk of the City of Torrance, State of California, hereby gives notice that on March 10th, 1924, the Street Superintendent of said City, having made an assessment pursuant to direction and order of the Board of Trustees of said City to cover the sum due for the work performed and specified in the Contract made under proceedings for the improvement of Martina, Manuel, and Watson Avenues and 218th Street in said City initiated by Resolution of Intention No. 147, passed November 6th, 1923, filed the same with me.

I hereby fix April 7th, 1924, as the time and the Council Chamber of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, in the City Hall of said City, as the place where and when all persons interested in the work done thereunder or in the said assessment, will be heard by the Board of Trustees.

This notice will also be published by the undersigned twice in the Torrance Herald, newspaper published in said City. The owners, the contractor or his assigns, and all other persons interested in the said work or in the said assessment, feeling aggrieved by any act of determination of the Superintendent of Streets or City Engineer in relation thereto, or who claim that the work has not been performed according to the contract in a good and substantial manner, or who claim that any portion of the work for any reason was omitted or illegally included in the contract for the same or having or making any objection of the correctness of the assessment or diagram or other act, determination or proceedings of the Superintendent of Streets or City Engineer, shall prior to the day fixed for the hearing upon the assessment, appeal to the Board of Trustees by briefly stating in writing the grounds of appeal.

For a description of the said work reference is hereby made to the above mentioned Resolution No. 147, passed by the Board of Trustees of said City of Torrance, November 6th, 1923.

ORDINANCE No. 83

An Ordinance of the City of Torrance Repealing Ordinance No. 23, and Repealing Ordinance No. 45 of the City of Torrance and Fixing Salaries for Various City Officials.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1
Ordinance No. 23 of the City of Torrance is hereby repealed.

Section 2
Ordinance No. 45 of the City of Torrance is hereby repealed.

Section 3
The City Marshal of the City of Torrance shall receive from said city as compensation for his services as such official the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) per month, payable fifty per cent (50%) thereof on the second day and fifty per cent (50%) thereof on the seventeenth day of each calendar month.

Section 4
The City Clerk of the City of Torrance shall receive from said city as compensation for his services as such official the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) per month, payable fifty per cent (50%) thereof on the first day and fifty per cent (50%) thereof on the seventeenth day of each calendar month.

Section 5
The City Recorder of the City of Torrance shall receive from said city as compensation for his services as such official the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per month, payable fifty per cent (50%) thereof on the second day and fifty per cent (50%) thereof on the seventeenth day of each calendar month.

Section 6
The City Treasurer of the City of Torrance shall receive from said city as compensation for his services as such official the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) per month, payable fifty per cent (50%) thereof on the second day and fifty per cent (50%) thereof on the seventeenth day of each calendar month.

Section 7
The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
