WIFE SAVERS

Before beating the whites of eggs, place on the ice in the refrigerator for at least an hour. They will beat stiff in one-fourth the time and will be perfectly white.

A pretty piece of furniture, and useful, too, that has put in an appearance within the last few years is the little end table which stands at the head or foot of a big divan. Sometimes each end of the divan is equipped with one of these handy little stands, straight along one side and curved at the other, which holds a reading lamp, a book, or the newest magazine. The straight side of the stand fits perfectly the straight end of the couch, and the curve of the outside end protects the occupants of the room from bumping into sharp corners or knocking the stand sideways in passing. Some of these stands are semi-circular in shape, others have variously designed sides and front edges, but all have cut-off corners and, in general, one front supporting leg and two rear legs. These tables may be used in very narrow halls to take the place of a console, and in small sunrooms they are very handy for putting close up against the wall, where they take up little room. An end table standing at the head of a chaise longue provides a convenient place to lay a book or magazine during a resting hour, and they are particularly pretty at either end of a day bed.

Prune Pudding.—Boil one pound of prunes; remove seeds and cut into small pieces; one cup of baking crumbs. Place in layers in a baking dish. Cover each layer with dots of butter and sprinkle with brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves. Cover with the water the prunes were boiled in and keep moist. Cover the top with a layer of chopped nut meats and plenty of butter. Bake slowly. Serve with the following sauce: One-quarter cup of butter, one cup of sugar. Beat butter and sugar to a cream, add two tablespoons boiling water, then beat again till the sauce is light and foamy like whipped cream.

Ink and grass stains are the two worst stains to contend with on children's clothes. To remove ink stains from either white or colored material, soak the stain while fresh in milk either sweet or sour, but sour is best because of the acid in it. Let the goods lie in this milk for several hours, then wash it gently in it. Pour off the milk and put on fresh, repeating the washing process. Let to lie in this over night. You will find that the spot is very faint, and upon washing the garment the stain will disappear altogether. For grass stains rub the spot with soft butter. Let it stand for several hours, then wash in warm water and soap and the stain will come out readily with the grease.

For the bride—Bracelets, watches, strings of pearls, one brooch, vanity case, pendant, earrings—daytime earrings of semi-precious stones and evening earrings of precious stones. For the bridegroom—A wrist watch; should be the best one can find. For girls—All kinds of charms. You can have the Coue charm, a medallion engraved on one side "In every way" etc., and on the reverse "Ca' passe." A Coue bracelet is formed of twenty beads. Other bridesmaids' gifts are pendants in crystal

or enamel engraved with dates and monograms of bride and groom. For the best man—Cuff links with two monograms; on one, that of the recipient, and on the other that of the giver. Wallet, cigarette cases of leather, gold or silver. Abroad canes are given, but this is not so usual here.

When preparing hash, if a slice of dry bread is ground through, following the meat and potatoes, not only will every morsel come from the grinder, but the flavor of the hash will be much improved.

Be careful how you adopt drastic reducing diets unless you are very seriously overweight. Bear in mind that a well balanced diet of small portions is more scientific than one which limits the individual to foods that are supposed to be in themselves thinning. Don't make up your mind all of a sudden that you must reduce, and commence taking so-called thinning remedies, thus wrecking your digestion and doing no good. This sort of thing requires study, and if you do not know the right things and the right quantities to take to get the best results, do your reducing under the supervision of your physician or get a book written by a recognized authority at the library or book shop and follow its teachings.

Dish Saving Ginger Cake.—Break an egg into a cup and fill it up with molasses. Pour into a bowl. Add one-half cup sugar, one-third cup shortening in same cup, one teaspoon soda in cup and fill up with hot water. Beat together, add one and one-half cups flour, one-half teaspoon salt, ginger and spice to taste.

The home dressmaker will find that a heavy grade of curtain marquisette is preferable to net for underwaists of silk dresses, since it is not only more durable but does not stretch as the net does.

To preserve oilcloth tacked around space near sink, stove or table in kitchen, enamel white after it has been put on the wall.


KEEPING UP
