SERIOUSNESS OF FOOT-MOUTH DISEASE AFFECTS EVERYONE IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

In an interview a prominent railway traffic man stated that, after reading the embargoes enacted by Arizona, Nevada and Oregon, he doubted very much if a balloon could cross the lines at a thousand feet elevation without breaking the strict laws enacted by these states.

California is totally surrounded by great agricultural and animal industry states, the safety and protection of which are as sacred and necessary to California as the district within our own political boundaries, since they, for the greater part, furnish the food supply of Southern California. It will be impossible for us to ask, or them to permit, any lessening in the rigor of quarantine enforcement until we ourselves are clean and they in turn are made to realize that we are no longer a source of contamination. How can we bring this about? Only through the full acceptance of our responsibility, which extends from federal, state, county and city governments to every manufactory, industry and commercial enterprise within our country, as well as to each individual citizen and to the stranger who is within our gates.

Can we accomplish this object and once more start the wheels of this great billion-dollar machine, which through years of perseverance and hard work and the expenditure of millions of dollars we have erected?

The federal government has committed to its care those questions of national and interstate significance, the state those questions of inter-county consequence, and our county and city governments have full jurisdiction over unincorporated and incorporated districts, respectively. Ordinances have been enacted and quarantine measures taken which are deemed necessary to meet the emergency and combat the disease at the earliest possible moment. These organizations are working in total harmony, and the ordinances are

without conflict or confusion. It is therefore a simple matter for the citizen to do his duty, which may be summed up in the five words, "strict obedience to the law." With a full understanding of the possibilities of contamination and infection, each of the inhibitions placed upon the citizen must be accepted by him as a necessary measure in the re-establishment of the functions of business which mean his individual prosperity. Unfortunately, it would seem the great majority of humanity do not think, and it thus entails upon the citizen the necessity of the establishment and maintenance of a great force of constabulary to protect the individual against himself.

Imagine, if you please, a great seaport handling the vast tonnage of the port of Boston, Mass., being closed for seven months. Southern California for the past three years has been the white spot of the world. Should this dread peril gain a substantial foothold, the white spot will vanish for many years. Let no sacrifice be too great! Let each individual forget his selfish lust for gain and devote 100 per cent of his energies to stamp out this terrible, loathsome menace that has come upon us, so that we may turn from a successful completion of a great accomplishment to our neighbors, the bordering states, with clean hands, and join those hands with them across the border in that union of peace and friendship so vitally necessary for our prosperity.

These embargoes menace the prosperity of our particular community. This means that citizens of this community who have money in the bank today to finance their crops already growing will not be able to ship the crops, and will be more than financially embarrassed this time next year. Your editor cannot bring this point home to each reader with too much force or emphasis. "IT MUST NOT PASS."

LEGION WILL GIVE PRIZES FOR ESSAYS

School Children Eligible for Anti-Communism Contest

SAN FRANCISCO.—The American Legion has announced a national essay contest for American school children, with scholarship prizes amounting to \$1,500, together with medals, for the best papers on the subject "Why Communism Is a Menace to Americanism," according to information received by Morgan Keaton, state adjutant of the organization.

State Superintendent of Schools Will C. Wadd will be asked to name three judges to pass upon the essays from California students.

The county school superintendent in each county of the state is to pick out the three judges to decide upon the best essays to be entered in the state contest, and in turn in the national competition.

The scholarship prizes in colleges to be designated by the winners are: First prize, \$750; second prize, \$500; third prize, \$250. First prize in each state will be a silver medal; second prize, a bronze medal; third prize, a certificate of merit issued by national American Legion headquarters.

The contest is limited to boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 18, inclusive.

The county essay contest will close June 15 next, and the state winners will be forwarded to Indianapolis, the legion headquarters, by August 10.

State Adjutant Keaton will issue further information on the contest within the next week.
