SOUTHEASTERN OUTPOST LOOKS LIKE PRODUCER

Empire Well Near Wilmington Makes Oil While Bailed

Making considerable oil while being bailed, the Empire Drilling company's outpost well in the southeastern extension of the field bids fair to prove up territory to the outskirts of Wilmington.
The well was bailed last week, while a large crowd of spectators watched. The cable broke, however, leaving the bailer in the hole.
A producer in this area would prove up a vast acreage. The well is located north of Weston street, not far west of Harbor boulevard.
The Petroleum Securities company led the field with new producers this week, when it brought in two fine new wells on the Marble ranch. Marble No. 25, completed at 3785 feet, is flowing at a rate of 1140 barrels. The gravity of the oil is 21 degrees. Gas

pressure on the tubing is 285 pounds. Twelve hundred-barrel production was obtained from Marble No. 24, completed at 3765 feet. The gauge on the tubing registers 250 pounds. The oil tests 24.2 degrees.
Chanslor-Canfield completed Torrance No. 46 for 1000-barrel production. This well is located on the old Redondo road, offsetting Doheny's Marble property.
On the east side E. J. Miley's Torrance No. 4 is making 700 barrels of 20.6 gravity oil, having been completed at 3845 feet. Gas pressure on the tubing is 200 pounds; on the casing 510 pounds.
The Miley lease is the best in the field, from a standpoint of yield per well. Four wells on the property are producing 3000 barrels a day.
Standard's Dominguez No. 2, a new completion, is making 250 barrels on the pump. It was completed at 3844 feet. Gravity is 18 degrees.
Chanslor-Canfield's Del Amo No. 10 is flowing at a rate of 50 barrels a day. It was drilled to 3519 feet.
No. 12, a south line well on the Santa Fe Kettler lease, is producing 100 barrels.

"IN THE GREASE"

Notes Gleaned While the Oil Editor Bumps Around Proven Territory

Interstate No. 4 of the Standard Oil company is being washed preparatory to swabbing. It was drilled to 3879 feet.

The Standard Oil company has purchased 100 acres of the Sentinel Oil company's Joughlin holdings along the old Redondo road (east) and has located three new wells on the property. The land involved in the transaction comprises a strip running south from the old Redondo road and lies between Superior's two Joughlin leases, east of E. J. Miley's holdings.

E. J. Miley replugged Torrance No. 3 back to 3850 feet, with such success that he made the well an 1100-barrel producer, about the best well on the whole east side. The well was originally drilled to 3912 feet, but came in wet. Plugged back to 3899, it made about 600 barrels, with 2 per cent water. Plugged back again, it made 1074 barrels of clean oil.

Miley has four wells on production in the field now, and his total production is consistently about 3000 barrels a day. That gives him the best average per well of any operator in the field. He is drilling three more on his east side lease.

The Shell Oil company has started development on the Scarborough lease on the old Redondo road (east). Scarborough No. 1 offsets Superior's Torrance No. 19, which is producing.

The Petroleum Securities company will have Marble No. 23 on production in a few days. No. 19 is down 3640 feet.

Standard is putting up cable tools at Felker No. 1, preparatory to bridging at 3650 feet.

Sentinel's Joughlin No. 4 is drilling in the oil sands and No. 5 is standing cemented.

Production on Doheny's Petroleum Securities Marble property is now 8000 barrels a day from nineteen producing wells.

Standard's Weston No. 1 is down 1800 feet. Surface casing has been landed.

Two wells are due in this week south of Carson street. They are Torrance No. 42 of the Chanslor-Canfield Midway Oil company and its offset on Petroleum Midway's Stock Community lease.

Standard's Marble Lease No. 6 is flowing at a rate of 350 barrels. The gravity is 21 degrees.

Production of the Standard Oil company in the field is 7200 barrels a day.

Chanslor-Canfield is swabbing Kettler No. 13, on the south line of the Kettler lease.

TRUSTEES

City Attorney Briney announced that the court will give a decision Wednesday morning on the sewer farm cases which were heard last week and the week before in Los Angeles. He said he believed the decision will not affect the agreement entered into by the Dominguez Land corporation and the city of Torrance.

The new board of trustees voted to grant the Bert S. Crossland post, American Legion, a permit to hold the Fiesta this year. No charge was made for the permit.

The Pan American Oil company applied for a franchise to lay pipe line in the unrestricted district of the city. The board authorized the city clerk to advertise for bids for same.

The trustees' table was beautifully decorated with a large basket of flowers, presented by Oltha Stevenson. The basket contained roses, tulips and larkspur, tastefully arranged. An appended card read as follows: "Grown in Torrance. To the Board of City Trustees."

Indicating that early action will be taken by Sanitary District No. 5, of which Torrance is a part, for the construction of a large trunk sewer, a letter from the regional planning commission calling a meeting of directors of the district was read. The directors include presidents of boards of trustees of Inglewood, Hawthorne and Torrance, and the chairman of the board of supervisors. Trustee Fitzhugh, as temporary chairman, will attend the meeting Monday morning in Los Angeles.

Owing to the fact that several accidents have occurred recently at the intersections of Plaza del Amo and Arlington, and Plaza del Amo and Carson, the board last night instructed the city attorney to prepare an ordinance providing for a boulevard stop at these points. Cars entering Carson or Arlington from Plaza del Amo will be required to stop at the intersection when the ordinance takes effect.

ORDINANCE No. 85

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association, or corporation to violate any of the rules and regulations for the control of the foot and mouth disease promulgated by the Director of Agriculture under date of March 5, 1924, as amended on March 13, 1924, or to fail, neglect or refuse to observe or to comply with each of the provisions of such rules and regulations.

Section 2. Any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$300.00, or by imprisonment for a period not to exceed 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon the passage hereof because the adoption and enforcement hereof is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety by reason of the fact that the public peace, health and safety is endangered by the threatened epidemic of the "foot and mouth disease"; this ordinance prior to the expiration of fifteen days from the passage hereof, shall be published twice in the Torrance Herald, a newspaper printed and published in the city of Torrance, State of California, together with the names of the members of the Board of Trustees voting for and against the same.

Section 4. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance as an emergency ordinance becoming effective at once, and shall cause the same to be published twice in the Torrance Herald.
