

### C. P. ROBERTS AND PARTY GET BIG "WRITE-UP" IN SPANISH

If you want to get a lot of free publicity go down to Mexico. The party of Californians from hereabouts who enjoyed a recent journey to Mazatlan returned with a clipping of the following article, published in Spanish in El Correo de la Tarde of Mazatlan, Mexico. The article, translated by H. W. T., follows:

"Once that they are convinced in foreign countries that the last rebellion in Mexico has been put under control, and that our country possesses an enormously rich field, and that the Mexican laws give ample guarantees, without injury from the natives to the capital which may come to exploit the natural riches, the business men are commencing to make excursions to study the possibilities of founding great industries in our territory, or of dedicating themselves to

agriculture on a large scale, to mining, or other branches of productive activity.

"With the confidence which is given by the assurance of being well received, a group of prominent wealthy men of the state of California of the United States, has just arrived at this city, some newspaper men and millionaires coming with those persons.

"The following persons who propose to develop in this region great industrial activities, made their arrival yesterday by train from the North: Mrs. Emma M. Harper, Mrs. de Blank, and Messrs. J. B. Dixon, C. P. Roberts, Curtis Peck, A. Blank, B. H. Brainer, W. H. Obrian, R. E. Hagley, M. McDonald, A. D. Davis, A. Richards and E. J. Camplin. Mr. Dixon is the editor of the 'California Oil News,'

and Mr. Roberts edits 'Printers' Review' of Los Angeles, California, respectively. Mrs. Harper is the owner of part of the lands known as 'El Palmito de la Virgen' ('The Palmetto of the Virgin') of Teacapan.

"The ladies and gentlemen whom we mention above were presented in a gallant manner in our office by the worthy Mr. A. R. Hernandez and by the learned Doctor B. S. Majalca, who informed us in detail concerning the object of the trip made by the travelers from California.

"The above mentioned business men come with the object of establishing important negotiations and dedicating themselves to agriculture, having chosen for the last the lands of Teacapan, where they have acquired sufficient land for the development of their activities and where, according to declarations made by the same interested parties, they will establish some industries of importance.

"The honorable guests visited our shops, taking with them the impression that they are the best set up, not only in this city, but also on all the western coast, so that, convincing themselves that our daily is the most important of its modern presentation as for its scope and circulation, having asked us for a few copies, we gave them to them with the greatest of pleasure.

"Mrs. Harper is a very pleasing and communicative woman and in her notes immediately an initiative spirit capable of great enterprises.

"Before our worthy visitors took their leave, a photograph was made of them, which we will publish in our tomorrow's edition.

"The excursionists lodged in the Central hotel, expecting to leave today, as we are informed, in order to continue their trip of study through our country.

"From another source we have been informed that the above mentioned business men who came to visit us in our offices yesterday undertook the trip to our territory in acceptance of the invitation made by President Obregon to all enterprising foreigners, in order that they might be personally convinced of the great advantages which will be gained for them by their activities in Mexico, where, as we said before, as long as they operate within our constitutional laws they will have every kind of guarantee.

"The government and the Mexican people are always with their arms opened to receive industrious foreigners, and of that good will and frank reception which is shown them they should take advantage without any fear whatever, considering that our people are characteristically hospitable and kind to all those who may benefit the sons of this rich country, which, for lack of capital which they may not extort from the people, finds itself still in the genesis of its industrial and agricultural development.

"Welcome, then, be all business men who may come to our country to consecrate their efforts and their capital for their own benefit and that of the Mexican people, provided that they know how to respect our laws.

"We are most sincerely grateful for the visit of the California excursionists, making special mention of Mrs. Harper, who, on account of speaking our language, showed herself very communicative, expressing her idea of establishing in this port a magazine for which she asked our collaboration, which we immediately offered her with the greatest of pleasure."
