WIFE SAVERS

Bunnies.—Mash York State cheese with a fork, then add enough sweet cream to make a spreading paste, and paprika to taste. Cut bread thin for sandwiches, butter and spread with the mixture, then toast on both sides.

Baked Halibut Steak.—Select two slices (or the required amount), trim off the dark skin. With a soft cloth press gently to absorb the moisture, then flour both sides, using either flour or corn meal. In a shallow dripping pan try out several thin slices of salt pork until the pan is well greased. Lay the fish on the strips of pork, shake over salt and pepper, and pour over a little of the fat. Bake about a half hour, basting once or twice with the fat in the pan, or until it is a golden brown. Serve on a hot platter with bits of butter scattered over it, and garnish with lemon and parsley.

At this time of the year, when you are digging into the hidden corners of your house and bringing to light all the things that have been tucked away all winter and deciding what to do with them, the following idea may be of help: One housekeeper has four large boxes. Into one she puts all materials that may be used alone or combined with other materials to make useful garments. Into the second box go all the pieces that may be used for quilts and comfortables; into the third, all the articles that she cannot use herself but which might prove useful to someone poorer; and into the fourth box go all materials that may be used in the making of rugs, braided or woven.

A very convenient and neat appearing arrangement for shoes can be made by fastening a flat curtain rod on the inside of the clothes closet door or side wall. Below this, as far apart as heel and sole, fasten a second rod, one used for drapes, as it will stand out about one inch farther from the door than the one above. Heels may be caught over the top rod and soles will rest on the lower one.

Chocolate Torte.—Melt half a pound of sweet chocolate and two or three tablespoons of powdered sugar with three tablespoons of warm water in a double boiler. Cook until it is a smooth paste and when cool add the yolks of four eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly each time you add a yolk. When cold, add the stiffly beaten egg whites. Line a thin cake tin, preferably a loaf tin, with wax paper, put in a layer of lady fingers or sponge cake, then a layer of the filling, another layer of cake, and last, a layer of filling. You will need about a dozen and a half of the lady fingers. Put in ice box for twelve hours. Top with whipped cream or marshmallow before serving.

Green Peppers.—Wash and prepare the peppers by cutting off the tops and taking out the white membrane, then boil in salted water ten minutes. Fill with a layer of rice (cooked), salt, pepper and a small piece of butter, then a layer of grated cheese, then rice and cheese alternately until filled, having cheese for the top layer. Dot with butter. Pour a little water in the pan and bake a half hour.

Queen's Pudding.—Take one cup bread crumbs, two cups milk, two yolks of eggs, one-half cup sugar, one small teaspoon butter, and red raspberry jam. Put the milk and bread crumbs on the fire to heat while beating the eggs and sugar. Combine both mixtures and pour into baking dish. Bake until it thickens like custard, remove from the oven, spread on the jam, then cover with the whites of two eggs beaten stiff with one tablespoon of powdered sugar. Put back in the oven to brown delicately.

Cereals should be kept in air-tight containers if you would retain their freshness.

When the meat chopper slips when you are using it, put a small wad of paper under it on the table, tighten the screw, and you will have no more trouble.

Mops are dirty and unpleasant things to wash. Try boiling them in an old pail half full of water into which a tablespoonful of lye has been dissolved. Rinse thoroughly and the mop will look like new.

mouth jar. It is then easy to lift out the amount needed. A small bottle of bluing may be kept in the medicine chest—labeled.

Try pasting white oilcloth in your knife-and-fork drawer. It does not curl up like paper and can easily be washed with soap and water.

If you have an electric suction cleaner use it to clean your wall paper and also on painted walls. Even before the painted walls are washed, removing the dust in this way simplifies the task a great deal. To remove grease stains from wall paper put a blotter over the stain and then heat your iron and put it over the blotter. In this way the blotter will absorb the grease.

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
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
