WIFE SAVERS By Mrs. Mary Morton

WEDDING BREAKFAST

Here is a suggestion for a yellow and white wedding breakfast: Pineapple cocktail; creamed chicken and mushrooms in patties; mashed potatoes; celery stalks stuffed with yellow cream cheese; orange marmalade; hot rolls (buttered); yellow brick ice cream with white heart in center; sunshine cake, angel cake; coffee. Fruit cake (the groom's cake) is usually served in addition.

Baked Omelet.—Separate the yolks and whites of four eggs and beat the former until lemon-colored. Add to the yolks a scant half teaspoonful of salt, two tablespoonfuls of milk, one-quarter of a teaspoonful of paprika, one and a half tablespoonfuls of chopped parsley, a tablespoonful of flour, and one-quarter of a teaspoonful of baking powder. Mix until smooth, fold in lightly the egg whites that have been whipped until dry, and turn into a greased soufflé dish. Have the dish only half filled and bake in a moderate oven about twenty minutes. Serve immediately, as it falls quickly when removed from the heat of the oven.

Tomato and Spaghetti Loaf.—Beat slightly four eggs, to which add two cups of canned tomato pulp, well seasoned, and two cups of cooked spaghetti. Transfer to a well oiled mold or bowl, and steam for one hour. Unmold and serve with a generous garnish of boiled ham or bacon.

Spiced Beef with Noodles.—Get about three pounds of top sirloin of beef (in one piece). Let stand in a pickle composed of the following for about two days, turning meat in the spiced mixture occasionally: One-half teaspoon of pepper, one-quarter teaspoon each of ground cloves and allspice, two tablespoons sugar, one-half cup of vinegar, one tablespoon salt, one small minced onion, one-half teaspoon celery salt, two bay leaves. Rub spices well into the meat before allowing it to stand. After removing from pickle, wipe dry. Heat one-half cup beef or bacon drippings, and brown meat in them. Then add three pints of water or stock and cook gently for two hours, or until meat is tender. At end of this time add enough water or stock to replace that which has evaporated, put in one-half package of noodles, and simmer until they are tender. Serve meat in center of dish surrounded by noodles over

which has been sprinkled grated cheese. When properly cooked this dish is delicious and has just the spicily flavor we all crave during the spring season.

Cauliflower au Gratin.—Make a cream gravy, pour over cauliflower that has been broken up and cooked until tender in very little water. Place cauliflower on platter, around which has been placed a border of fried noodles, pour gravy over cauliflower, then cover with three-quarters pound of grated cheese, and over this crumbs made of cornflakes that have been browned in oven. Garnish with a sprinkling of parsley and thin slices of lemon. This makes an appetizing luncheon dish.

CHOICE OF A MATTRESS

Whatever type of bedstead you choose, expensive or the reverse, do not economize on the mattress you buy to go with it. A good mattress will last a lifetime with care, and is, therefore, a good investment. They are filled with corn husks, grass and hay, wool or cotton felt, or hair. Cotton felt makes a good and inexpensive mattress. The felt is built up carefully layer by layer and makes a very comfortable mattress, but is not quite as easily made over as some other kinds. Horse hair has long been considered the standard filling for a mattress of good quality. The hair is washed, sterilized under steam pressure and coiled in huge ropes to produce the curled hair.

Mattress pads protect the mattress from soiling and are so easily washed that it is advisable to use them. They may be bought in standard sizes. Dust covers keep the mattress free from dust and may also be purchased or made at home from bleached muslin.

Fish Timbales.—Use the left-over fish left from yesterday's dinner and, after removing the skin and bones, chop finely. For one large cupful of the fish add half a teaspoonful of lemon juice, half a cupful of soft bread crumbs, salt and paprika to taste, a few drops of onion juice and one beaten egg. Turn into greased cups and steam about three-quarters of an hour. Serve with a caper sauce.
