C. of C. Directors Here Take Emphatic Stand Against Big Power Issue Before Voters

Directors of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce Tuesday afternoon took an emphatic stand against the California Water and Power act, which will come before the voters of California at the November election.

The resolution passed by the board follows:

"Whereas, There is a proposition to come before the voters of the state of California at this fall election, known as the California Water and Power Act; and

"Whereas, Said act proposes to bond the state of California, in the sum of five hundred millions of dollars and the full faith and credit of the state of California is to be pledged for the principal and interest of said bonds; and

"Whereas, Said act shall have power:

"(a) To acquire by purchase, lease, condemnation, gift or other legal means, land, water, water rights, easements, electric energy lines, structures, roads, railroads, machinery and equipment, and to do any and all things necessary or convenient for the conservation, development, storage and distribution of water; and the generation, transmission and distribution of electric energy; and

"(b) To acquire or construct for political subdivisions distributing systems of water or electric energy bought from the state, upon terms that, in the opinion of the board, will repay to the state within twenty-five years the cost thereof with interest. The title to or interest of the state in such systems shall vest in the political subdivision when paid for;

"(c) To sue and be sued, and to exercise in the name of the state the power of eminent domain for public use, to take, hold, use, sell, lease, or the use or joint use of any property, deemed by the board necessary for the purposes of this article;

"(d) To provide itself with suitable office and field facilities, and to fix the compensation of such expert, technical officers, legal and clerical assistants and other employees as it may require, subject to such civil service regulations as the board may provide;

"(e) To define the project and to adopt rules and regulations to govern its activities;

"(f) To exercise all powers needed for the accomplishment of the purposes of this article and such additional powers as may be granted by the legislature; and

"(g) To exercise the power of eminent domain for public use, to take, hold, use, sell, lease, or the use or joint use of any property, deemed by the board necessary for the purposes of this article and such additional powers as may be granted by the legislature; and

Oil World Sees Importance Of New Campbell Producer

The following appeared in the current issue of the California Oil World:

"Interest in the Torrance field has been given new impetus by the Consolidated Mutual's completion of Campbell No. 1, on the Preston-Dorland tract on East Weston street, just across Harbor boulevard, since it opens up an entirely new area to the drill."

"While the well generally is rated as a 250-barrel producer, some experts who have viewed its operations believe it is good for from 400 to 500 barrels daily, but the gravity is only 28.5 degrees, considerably lower than that secured in the wells being completed in the southeastern extension of the field."

Consolidated Pioneer

"It was the Consolidated Mutual which first pioneered the southeastern area at a time when the majority of companies were frantically digging for oil in the Lomita and the Midway Northern areas. Its first well was the Oakley No. 1, located so far to the southeast it was regarded as the wildest kind of a wildcat. Although it came in with a flow of 2000 barrels it did not stand up to this record for long, as water trouble developed and another well was finally drilled by the company."


Not Taken Seriously

"Campbell No. 1 is the most southerly producer in the Torrance field, and extends the producing area fully half a mile to the south. Its completion, after being bridged back from 3225 to 3790 feet, has given the field experts something to mull over, for it offers the biggest possibilities of any well completed in the local field in many months. Just what will be the outcome is difficult to predict at this date, but all are agreed that the possibilities look good for proving up practically all the intervening acreage between the Redondo road and the present producer."

"Strange to say, field dopsters never took the present location seriously. The rig was built by the Preston-Dorland interests more than a year ago, and generally was regarded as another real estate draw card. Finally it was taken over by the Consolidated Mutual, and little attention has been paid to it until oil showings were reported."

Fan-Shaped Structure

"Some observers express the belief that the unusually good results being obtained on the Joughin and Standard Oil—particularly as they approach the southerly edges of these leases—indicate the structure turns off and spreads out fan-like to the south. Just how far either way cannot, of course, be determined by one well, but the new producer has put a lot of pep into the companies holding large acreage yet undrilled. While not all of this will prove productive, it is assumed that some of the best wells yet to be secured in the Torrance field will be completed on these Joughin leases south of Redondo boulevard."
