soiled by cooking. Preparing a dessert or a salad early in the day for the evening meal, baking a sufficient supply of cakes and cookies for two or three days, an occasional roast to serve for several meals, hot, cold or in gravy; preserves and fruits canned in quantities when plentiful, will shorten the time spent in preparing meals daily. Housekeepers who see successfully find that it is an economy of both labor and money to make their own clothes and use the saving for service in weekly cleaning and laundry, thus having more time for necessary recreation.

Cup Cakes.—Two tablespoons butter, three-fourths cup sugar, one-half teaspoon soda dissolved in one-half cup sour milk, one egg, one and one-half cups flour, one teaspoon baking powder, one-eighth teaspoon salt, one-third cup chopped walnut meats, one-half cup chopped seeded raisins, vanilla, nutmeg.

NEW DOUBLE BOILER
A double boiler has been added to the list of electric table cooking appliances. This double boiler, made of aluminum, has a heating element at the bottom of the lower container, and the connecting cord can be plugged in much the same way as with the electric grill, percolator or toaster. It is supplied with a wire stand which prevents its scorching the table. The maker states that this double boiler which has a capacity of a quart and a pint, will bring foods cooked in it to boil in ten minutes.

Corn Bread.—One egg beaten, pinch of salt, two teaspoons sugar, three-fourths cup sweet milk, one teaspoon baking powder, one tablespoon melted butter, scant half cup white flour, scant half cup yellow cornmeal. Bake in buttered pan for twenty minutes.

Cheese Puffs.—Melt two tablespoons butter, add two tablespoons sifted flour, one-half teaspoon salt and a little paprika. Stir constantly, and when smooth add one and one-half cups milk gradually. Stir until boiling point is reached and then add one cup sliced or grated cheese. When the cheese is melted add one cup cooked rice. Add three well beaten egg yolks and mix well, using a fork so that the rice grains may not be broken. Fold in three stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into a buttered baking dish, or several individual baking dishes, surround with hot water and bake about one-half hour in a moderate oven.

One experienced housekeeper has this to say to her sister housewives: "If mothers would take the short-cuts in housekeeping and devote more time to self-improvement, both mental and physical, they would fulfill their duty as mothers and wives better. There's no reason why the girl who once played the piano should give up her accomplishment altogether. Daily reading, too, should be a part of a mother's duty, that she may be an inspiration to her children and an intelligent companion to her husband. Recreation is as essential as dishwashing. Nor should the importance of club work be overlooked. I know one hears the plaint 'But how have I time for all these things?' The only way to find time is to come to an early realization that there are things that bring greater returns in the scheme of life than chasing dust and dirt and keeping the children clothed in much decorated frocks. Cleanly of course we should be, but not meticulously so."

Ham en Casserole.—Place small thick slice of ham in baking dish, add sliced potatoes, cover with hot milk, sprinkle with paprika, and cook in moderate oven one hour.

An easy Coleslaw.—Slice very thin one-half small head cabbage, season with pepper, salt and a little sugar, add three tablespoons hot vinegar and one tablespoon any favorite mayonnaise. Mix well.

Mercerized cotton has a distinctly silk-like gloss. This gloss, being permanent, makes the cloth much more valuable for many purposes than ordinary cotton is. Moreover, mercerization actually increases the strength of the material, making it much better wearing. It increases the capacity of the cloth for holding dye, too.

For all these reasons, one pays more for mercerized cotton than for plain cotton. It is more costly to produce for two reasons. First, the process involves expense, and second, the quality of cloth ordinarily used for mercerization is the best long staple sea island and Egyptian cotton, since the cheaper grades of cotton do not mercerize well. It is said that a high-grade piece of mercerized cotton costs three times as much to manufacture as an unmercerized piece does.

The shopper must be able to tell with certainty that the cloth she thinks is "mercerized" is not merely calendared, for calendared cotton is no more durable than ordinary cotton, and its gloss will come off in the first laundering. The simple and sure test for true mercerization is to wash a sample of the cloth. If the luster "stays" the material is mercerized.

Apple Fritters.—Three-fourths cup sifted flour, one teaspoon baking powder, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one tablespoon sugar, one-fourth cup milk, one-third beaten egg, two tart apples. Mix and beat

the dry ingredients and stir into them the beaten egg with which the milk has been mixed. Wash, core and pare the apples, cut into rings and dip into the batter. Fry in deep hot oil and drain on paper.

Sauce.—One cup boiling water, one cup sugar, one and one-half tablespoons flour, pinch of salt, one tablespoon butter, one teaspoon vanilla. Boil five minutes, add vanilla. Serve hot. This makes six fritters.

Butterscotch Whip.—One cup milk, two cups brown sugar, two tablespoons flour, two tablespoons cold water, one egg yolk (could use beaten egg left from fritters). Heat milk, mix remaining ingredients, pour into hot milk, boil three minutes. Cool, add one-fourth cup nut meats and one-half teaspoon vanilla. This is enough for two portions.

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION No. 208

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, California, pursuant to the provisions of the "Improvement Act of 1911" and the "Improvement Bond Act of 1915," and acts supplementary thereto and amendatory thereof, do resolve as follows:

Section 1. That the public interest and convenience require and that it is the intention of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, State of California, to order the following work to be done and improvement made in said city, to-wit:

That portions of the alleys in Blocks 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 17, 18, 69, 70, 71, 72, 73, 74, 75, 85, 86 and 113 of the Torrance Tract as shown on map thereof filed in Book 22, pages 94 and 95, Los Angeles County official records, be improved in the manner, at the places and to the extent shown upon the plans therefor adopted by the said Board of Trustees September 29, 1924, and now on file in the office of the City Engineer of the City of Torrance, said improvement to consist of grading said alleys and paving portions of the same with asphaltic pavement consisting of 3 inch asphaltic concrete base and 1 inch Willito Torpeka Wearing Surface, and constructing four inch vitrified clay pipe sewer laterals for house connections, one for each lot subdivision fronting on said work.

Section 2. That all of said work shall be done and improvement made in accordance with lines, grades, profiles, elevations, locations and cross-sections to and within the limits shown upon the plans therefor adopted by the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, and all dimensions and notations thereon shall apply and be conforming to and observed in doing said work and in making said improvement, and the same are incorporated herein and made a part hereof and reference is hereby made thereto for a more full, complete and detailed description of said work and improvement.

The said grading shall be done in accordance with specifications contained in Ordinance No. 19 of the City of Torrance.

Said Asphaltic Willito Pavement shall be constructed in accordance with Specifications No. 20 adopted by Resolution No. 160 of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance.

Said sewer laterals shall be constructed in accordance with Specifications No. 21 adopted by Resolution No. 187 of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance.

Section 3. That said contemplated work and improvement, in the opinion of said Board of Trustees, is of more than local or ordinary public benefit and said Board hereby makes the expense of said work and improvement chargeable upon the district which said Board hereby declares to be the district benefited by said work and improvement and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, which said district is bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

All that district of lands situate, lying and being in the City of Torrance, shown within the colored district boundary line upon Map showing said district to be assessed now on file in the office of the City Engineer of the City of Torrance, excepting from said described district the area of all public streets, avenues, alleys, parks or lands contained therein.

Section 4. Notice is hereby given that Serial Bonds to represent unpaid assessments, and to bear interest at the rate of seven per cent (7%) per annum, will be issued hereunder, in the manner provided by the "Improvement Bond Act of 1915," the last installment of which bonds shall mature nine years from the second day of July next succeeding ten months from their date.

Section 5. Notice is hereby given that on Monday, the 8th day of December, 1924, at 8 o'clock p. m., in the council chamber of the Board of Trustees located in the City Hall in said City of Torrance, any and all persons having any objections to the proposed work or improvement, or to the extent of the district to be assessed, or both, may appear before said Board of Trustees and show cause why said work and improvement should not be carried out in accordance with this Resolution.

Section 6. The City Engineer is hereby directed to make a diagram of the property affected or bene-

fited by the proposed work and improvement as described in this Resolution of Intention and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof; such diagram shall show each separate lot, piece, or parcel of land, the area in square feet of each said lots, pieces or parcels of land and the relative location of same to the proposed work to be done, all within the limits of the assessment district.

Section 7. All of the streets and avenues referred to in this Resolution of Intention are public ways in the City of Torrance, California.

Section 8. The Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper, published and circulated in the City of Torrance, is hereby designated as the newspaper in which this Resolution of Intention shall be published, and the City Clerk of said City is hereby directed to cause this Resolution of Intention to be published by two insertions in said newspaper in the manner and form required by law.

Section 9. The Superintendent of Streets of said City shall, after the adoption of this Resolution of Intention, cause to be conspicuously posted along the lines of said contemplated work and improvement and along all the open streets within the heretofore described assessment district, notices of the passage of this Resolution of Intention in the manner and form required by law.

Section 10. All of the proceedings for the aforesaid work and improvement shall be had and


taken under and in accordance with those acts of the Legislature of the State of California known and designated as the "Improvement Act of 1911," approved April 7th, 1911, and the "Improvement Bond Act of 1915," approved June 11th, 1915, and under all acts supplementary thereto or amendatory thereof.

Section 11. Reference is hereby made to the California Willite Road Construction Company's Plastic Composition License Mixture Agreement, dated the 18th day of August, 1924, and on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City of Torrance.
