Your Income Tax This Year

net profits of a business or any profession, plus any other outside income such as rents, profits on real estate sales, interest, etc. From this total is deducted interest paid, taxes other than income tax, bad debts, contributions, losses by fires not covered by insurance. The balance is the net income, and from this is deducted the personal exemption and other untaxable items, the result being taxable income. Persons whose net income is less than \$1000, if unmarried, or under \$2500, if married, need not, therefore, make returns.

Watch the Rules
 An additional penalty has been imposed this year for any person deducting from his income items disallowed under the regulations. This is 6 percent per annum interest on the deficiency of tax and 5 percent on the amount of same. Therefore it is desirable for persons making out their own returns carefully to study regulations No. 45, consisting of 1661 rules, before taking any deduction disallowed. When one stops to think, this is only fair to the government in view of the liberal allowances. Again we have a further relief in the surtax this year, the rates starting at \$10,000, instead of \$6000, as in 1923.

Another point to bear in mind is that the department is going to be very strict as to filing information returns as to payments of \$1000 or more to anyone for salaries, rents, commissions, etc. These returns must be sent to Washington, D. C., direct before the 15th of March.


WED AT HOTEL
