WIFE SAVERS BY MRS. MARY MORTON

Scrambled Eggs.—Five eggs, two tablespoons milk, one teaspoon butter, a little salt. Melt butter in the frying pan, add other ingredients and cook gently, stirring until thick.

Creamed Tuna or Codfish.—If you use codfish pick into small pieces, cover with cold water in a saucepan, and let it come to a boil and gently simmer (not boil) for five minutes, then drain. Put one large tablespoon butter into the saucepan, melt, add two tablespoons flour, mix smooth, add gradually two cups sweet milk, cook, stirring constantly, until smooth and thick. Season, add fish and gently simmer. Tuna fish must be drained from the oil in the can and flaked.

Tapioea Cream Pudding.—Cook two tablespoons of minute tapioea in a quart of milk for 15 minutes. Remove from fire. Mix yolks of two eggs with half a cup of sugar, one-half teaspoon salt, and add to tapioea and milk. Return to fire and cook until thick, add any desired flavoring—grated orange peel or teaspoon vanilla—fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs, and set aside to cool.

In the midst of plenty, thousands of American children are not getting the foods they need for the highest development of mind and body. The United States has more food and better food than any other nation. Our pure food laws and sanitary methods of handling food supplies are world-famous. Along with our efforts to safeguard health through food control, however, we need to develop better food habits and so reduce our alarmingly high percentage of malnutrition. For the undernourished child does not have a fair start, and everything is harder for him. Even though his body may outgrow some of the visible signs of malnutrition, others not so apparent remain. His

resistance is likely to be lowered so that he "catches" diseases easily. Faulty mental habits cling, and in countless other ways he carries a handicap all through life.

The well nourished child has an erect, sturdy, well developed body, with straight legs, flat shoulder blades, full rounded chest, strong white teeth, and firm, rosy flesh. The expression of its eyes and face denotes a keen, happy mind, and all its movements show vigor and energy without undue nervousness.

A burned saucepan should be filled with cold water, to which a liberal allowance of soda has been added. Let it stand for an hour or so, after which heat the water slowly for a few minutes and the burned particles will come off quite easily.

The well varnished kitchen floor reduces the housewife's work tenfold. This is equally true of the painted floor and the one which is covered with linoleum. A coat of varnish over either makes it easy to mop up, and it will look as bright afterward. Varnish saves muscle and time and keeps the kitchen floor always shining.

Warm-Up Potatoes.—Chop or slice cold boiled potatoes. Put a little butter and milk in the frying pan, boil up, add the potatoes, cook, stirring occasionally. Season with salt and pepper. Cook until milk is thickened.

Spinach.—Look spinach over carefully, wash in at least four waters, drain in a colander, and cut through with a knife while draining. Boil twenty or thirty minutes, season with salt, pepper and butter. Boil two eggs hard, slice, and place on top of spinach before serving.

Macaroni Rabbit.—Put one teaspoon butter into frying pan. When hot add one cupful of cold boiled macaroni cut fine. To it add one cupful grated cheese and two beaten eggs. Dust with pepper and a little salt and cook until mixture is set.

Hot Slaw.—Chop up a cabbage and cook in hot water until tender. Drain in a colander, then add one-half cup vinegar, tablespoon butter, salt and pepper to taste. Heat together thoroughly and serve hot. If cabbage is cooked without a cover it will not scent the house much.

Oatmeal Cookies.—Cream three-fourths cup butter with one cup sugar, add two well beaten eggs. Sift three-fourths teaspoon soda in two cups flour, add one-half teaspoon salt, one teaspoon cinnamon, add two cups uncooked rolled oats and one scant cup chopped raisins sprinkled with flour or one-half cup raisins and one-half cup chopped nut meats. Drop on buttered tins and bake.

TOOLS FOR HOUSECLEANING
No matter how carefully the housecleaning is planned, it cannot be done easily and quickly without suitable cleaning tools and materials. The ideal arrangement is to have a

complete set stored in orderly fashion in a convenient, well ventilated closet. Whether few or many kinds are needed, it is economical to buy well made, durable tools and keep them in good condition and grouped together if possible. The initial cost of implements of good quality may be a trifle greater than those of poorer grade, but substantial ones generally give longer and better service and are more economical in the end.

In washing the cheap ready-made rag rugs, do not wring them by hand, but flatly fold and run through a wringer if possible, or throw them over a line to drip until the excess water has run off. Then lay them down on a laundry table and let them dry, turning occasionally. If they are dried on a line they stretch all out of shape, so that when placed on the floor they ruffle at the sides.

Before washing cotton stockings put a handful of common salt in the washing water. This will set the dye.
