THE new ambassador to the Court of St. James spoke, as do all our plenipotentiaries to London, at the dinner of the Pilgrim Society.

Unlike predecessors, our new ambassador eschewed the time-honored custom of extending "hands across the sea." Instead of boring his hearers with the old "You and we are cousins and the destiny of the world depends on continuance of the ties of friendship that bind us," the new ambassador bluntly declared that if Europe expects America to continue loaning money to Old World powers Europe had best prove by definite activities that she is honestly seeking to promote peace.

As the first official statement of foreign policy since Mr. Kellogg became secretary of state, the announcement was received with keen interest all over the world.

REBEL film producers, breaking away from the Moving Picture Producers Association carried by Will Hays, announce that they will seek the services of Gen. John J. Pershing or Herbert Hoover as their own particular king.

The remuneration offered these two men will probably be tempting. But Mr. Hoover is already a wealthy man and Gen. Pershing, we hope, will refuse.

Pershing had and did well about the biggest job that has been handed to an individual in modern times. To become chief of the rebel producers, leading a faction in a fight for dollars—that's what it is—would be beneath the dignity of the man of Chaumont.

NEW YORK'S fleet of prohibition enforcing ships has thrown an effective blockade around Rum Row off Sandy Hook. The success of this move establishes the fact that liquor can be pretty effectively kept from landing on our shores—at least in spots.

But the coastline is long. To match the New York prohibition fleet at every Atlantic and Pacific port would be a stupendous task. However, if this country seriously makes up its mind to shut the doors to illicit liquor, the task will be accomplished. Our resources are sufficient to allow almost any expenditure necessary to do the job.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE has before him an interesting tax reduction bill proposed by Congressman Bacharach of New Jersey. Everyone who pays money to Uncle Sam in taxes, directly or indirectly, should be acquainted with the provisions of the suggested measure.

First of all Mr. Bacharach told the President that "scientific" reduction would not pass the House and Senate unless it was also reduction with a political appeal.

The chief provisions of the proposed bill, contemplating annual tax cuts of \$400,000,000, propose:

- 1—Elimination of taxes on automobiles and accessories, motor boats, jewelry and club dues—a reduction of approximately \$150,000,000.
- 2—Elimination of amusement tax so as to apply only on admissions above \$1.50—a cut of about \$80,000,000.
- 3—Reduction of the inheritance tax to a maximum of 20 per cent, the minimum rate to begin at \$100,000—a reduction of \$50,000,000. A similar cut on gift taxes, amounting to \$5,000,000.
- 4—Reduction of the maximum surtax rate to 20 per cent, the tax to apply to incomes above \$15,000.
- 5—Reduction in rates of increased allowance for dependents on incomes between \$2000 and \$10,000.


This was an open meeting and was greatly enjoyed by the audience. The secretary of the club is busy preparing ballots for the next meeting, which will be the primary election.


