FAVORS IMPROVEMENT

To the Editor, Torrance Herald, Dear Sir: I notice that you are holding open the columns of the Herald for expressions of opinion of the citizens of Torrance on matters now pending for improvement of the City. I therefore venture to give my views.

With regard to the lighting system, I would most emphatically say that this is a crying necessity for the north end of the city, where there are no lights at all. The property owners I am sure would welcome such an improvement in their section and be willing to pay for same. I do not see the necessity, at the present time of tearing up the whole of the present system, which is efficient, although the spindle-shank lamp posts are not artistic; they would eventually be replaced.

Redondo boulevard should be improved, as this will enable the city to spread out west and benefit property owners. On the other hand I am of the opinion that it would not bring more people through the town. The same condition would obtain as in other towns where the main road runs to the north, traffic thus missing the city in passing through.

DIFFERS WITH US

Editor: Your column of Observations is always interesting, albeit your conclusions do not always agree with the conclusions of your readers. You conclude that we cannot make people more moral by law, but you will have to admit that we can check immorality by law; at least all governments are run on that principle. Surely you would not abolish the law against the gambler and the dope peddler. We fought a great war to establish laws against human slavery. We have had to enact laws against the money extortioner and the confidence man. As with most questions, is there not a middle ground here? Good and humane laws make better citizens. Better citizens make good and humane laws. Good and bad laws react on the people. We concede that progress was made when laws imprisoning men for debt were abolished.

Why do we seek to abolish capital punishment? Is it not because people are coming to see that a bad law brutalizes and degrades the people? So Coolidge proposes to bring us prosperity by giving the big exploiters a free hand. In other words, let them feast to the fullest so that the workers may have a chance for some crumbs. Also takes a Pullman when traveling instead of a private car, but keeps the private yacht that costs the government \$300,000 a year.

You can come pretty near fooling all the people all the time. Economy is good and has its place. Lincoln was a great political economist, but not of the nutmeg variety. He thought it strange that men should ask a just God's assistance in wringing bread from the sweat of other men's faces, and that is what our profiteers and industrial lords are doing. And Coolidge is telling them to go to it, free for all and no interference if I can help it.

"That the rewards of industrial

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energy be free from confiscatory restrictions." You speak of those who flout the right to property and the world's greatest philosophers. Who but exploiters, whom Coolidge wishes to go unrestricted, are flouting the right to property? For government statistics bear out the fact that the producers of wealth are rapidly becoming homeless and propertyless.

According to the Christian World, our Divine Master stands without a peer as the world's greatest philosopher. He taught against waste, and he also taught against hoarding—"Lay not up," etc. When he fed the Israelites he just gave them manna enough for one day and he taught us to pray "Give us THIS day our daily bread."

A truth you can count on is this: that poverty and crime will continue to increase so long as men are only allowed to produce when they can make a profit for the industrial lords. When we obey Christ's teachings and seek the common good as the highest good of all we will produce for use and not for profit. Brisbane tells us that Texas, intensely cultivated, can feed the world.
