LUTHERAN On Sunday, Oct. 25, Lutheran services were held at the Torrance Theatre on Sartori avenue. The attendance was better than that of the afternoon services conducted heretofore. The Rev. W. Lange of Inglewood conducted the service from 9 to 10, after which he returned to conduct the service in Inglewood at 10:30. The Sunday School session was in charge of Rev. William Kolbe, Canadian Lutheran missionary, who at the present time is residing in Los Angeles for his health. Lutheran services will be held regularly at the Torrance Theatre every Sunday morning. Preaching service at 9 o'clock and Sunday School at 10. All Lutherans and others interested are cordially invited to attend. On Sunday morning, Nov. 1, the pastor, Rev. W. Lange, will base his sermon on Reformation thoughts.

WIFE SAVERS BY MRS. MARY MORTON

Indoor cleaning plans should be laid with the thought foremost of getting through as quietly as possible. Here is where a homemaker shows her executive ability to best advantage. If she lacks in this it will be evidenced to the outsider by a disturbed family and a confused house. Plan just what you can afford to do and before starting decide on the best method of operating. Take a room or a floor at a time. Never put your family through the confusion and nervous irritation accompanying an entire house upset. Start the period of housecleaning by first taking stock of the pantry shelves. Canned soup, vegetables, fish and several meats will minimize the meal problem. Scalloped Potatoes.—Peel one quart of raw potatoes and slice into one-quarter-inch pieces. Arrange them in layers in a buttered baking dish. Sprinkle each layer with flour (four tablespoons in all), salt and pepper, and a few dots of butter. Add two cups milk, and bake in a moderate oven until the potatoes are soft and browned.

Old-Time Almond Cookies.—One-half cup butter, one cup sugar, one-third cup almonds blanched and finely chopped, one egg beaten lightly, one-half teaspoon cinnamon, one-quarter teaspoon cloves, one-half teaspoon nutmeg, one-eighth teaspoon salt, grated rind of half a lemon, two tablespoons milk or water, one cup flour, one cup oatmeal, two teaspoons baking powder, thoroughly mixed; add lemon rind and milk. Roll into walnut one and one-half inches apart on a buttered sheet. Spread with a spatula and press the half of an almond meat on top of each. Bake in a moderate oven 12 to 15 minutes.

Dessert.—A dish which may do double duty, either as fruit salad or dessert, and which is as appetizing as it is novel and dainty, can be made in the following manner: Pare and core firm, tart apples of uniform size. For twelve apples allow one cup sugar, a nickel's worth of cinnamon drops, and as little water as will serve to cook the apples until tender. Care must be taken that they do not become too soft. If a deeper red is desired, add a few drops of fruit coloring. When tender, remove from pan and fill centers with chopped nuts mixed with a syrup in which apples were cooked; if this is thin, cook till it is a soft jelly before adding nuts. When cold, slice apples in two crosswise with a sharp knife and place each half in an individual mold, cut side down. Over these pour lemon gelatine enough to cover the apple. Unmelt when cold and firm, and serve with a border of whipped cream or salad dressing. This dish is delicious with the pleasing combination of flavors well blended. It adds zest and piquancy to the menu.

Fried Cakes.—Three-fourths cup sugar, one egg, three tablespoons melted lard, one-half cup mashed potatoes, one-half cup milk, a little salt and nutmeg, three teaspoons baking powder. Add as much flour as necessary to make a soft dough and fry in deep, hot fat.

Rice Pudding.—One small cup cooked rice, one-half cup sugar, two eggs, two tablespoons fine cocoanut, one teaspoon vanilla, one pint milk. Mix well and bake for one-half hour or until it is brown.

Pork Balls with Sauerkraut.—Mix one pound of uncooked rice, one pound of freshly ground pork and one egg into little balls. Put some of the balls in baking dish and cover with sauerkraut, filling the dish with alternate layers of pork balls and kraut. Bake one hour.

ANNOUNCING THE ENGAGEMENT A radio party is a most up-to-date way of announcing your own or a friend's engagement. A radio instrument may furnish the evening's entertainment. Then at the supper table the centerpiece and serving cups carry out the idea. They are made from cardboard in a clever imitation of the real radio set. Attached to a ribbon which comes from the receiving wires is a card on which is written: "Hear the news." On the reverse side are the names of the engaged couple.

Orange Shortcake.—Slice two oranges, cover with sugar and let stand while making the crust. Make a rich biscuit dough as for any shortcake. Bake. Put oranges between crusts and serve with the following sauce: Squeeze the juice of four oranges, adding the grated rind of two. Add half as much water as there is juice and sweeten to taste. Let boil with enough cornstarch to thicken to the consistency of cream. Serve hot.

Combination Rarebit.—Melt two tablespoons butter, add two tablespoons flour, salt and pepper, three-quarters cup cheese cut up, and cup milk. Cook until blended. Put a layer of cooked spaghetti in a casserole. Sprinkle over this a layer of minced boiled or fried ham and then some of the sauce. Continue until casserole is full, top with crumbs, and bake 15 minutes in a hot oven.


