ORDINANCE No. 126

An Ordinance Calling a Special Election To Be Held in Certain Territory To Be Known as Northwest Torrance on the 9th Day of February, 1926, and Providing for the Submitting to the Qualified Electors of Said District the Proposition of Annexing Said Territory to the City of Torrance, Designating the Polling Place and Appointing Election Officers for Said Election.

WHEREAS there was filed with the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance at a meeting thereof held on the 26th day of December, 1925, a petition signed by thirty-one persons who declared themselves to be qualified electors of the district hereinafter described, and which petition requested that a special election be held within said territory submitting to the electors therein the question whether such territory shall be annexed to, incorporated in and made a part of said City of Torrance, and

WHEREAS it appears that said petition is in form as required by an act of the legislature of the State of California entitled, "An Act to provide for the alteration of the boundaries of and for the annexation of territory to municipal corporations, for the incorporation of such annexed territory in and as a part thereof, and for the districting, government and municipal control of such annexed territory," approved June 11, 1913. Now therefore,

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. The petition hereinafter mentioned is hereby declared to be a valid and sufficient petition to require this Board of Trustees to call the election therein requested.

SECTION 2. An election shall be held on the 9th day of February, 1926, in Northwest Torrance, which district or territory is more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the northeast corner of the City of Torrance as of date December 8, 1925, which said point is in the western boundary of the City of Los Angeles, in Western Avenue as said boundary, existed thence northerly along the west boundary of the City of Los Angeles to a point thereon three hundred and thir-

teen and twelve hundredths (313.12) feet north of the Southeast corner of Lot Seventy (70) of the McDonald Tract, in the Rancho San Pedro, as per map recorded in Book 15, pages 21 and 22, Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County, California; thence West parallel to the south line of said Lot 70 a distance of Six Hundred Twenty-six and Ninety Hundredths (626.90) feet; thence South parallel to the east line of said Lot 70 to the south line of the said McDonald Tract, in the Rancho San Pedro, as per map recorded in Book 15, pages 21 and 22, Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County; thence west along the said South line of the said McDonald Tract, to the point of intersection thereof with the westerly line of that certain Four Hundred Two and Forty-seven Hundredths (402.47) acre tract, known as Lot 1 of the Maria de los Reyes Dominguez One Thousand Twenty-eight and Sixty Hundredths (1028.61) acre allotment, which is part of the Rancho San Pedro allotted to Manuel Dominguez as per Superior Court Case No. 3234, Recorder's filed map No. 135, Records of Los Angeles County; thence Southeast along the westerly line of said Lot 1, to the point of intersection thereof with the Southerly boundary of Beryl Street, as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; thence Southwesterly along the Southeast boundary of the said Beryl Street to the point of intersection thereof with the East boundary of the City of Redondo Beach, as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; thence Southeast along the easterly boundary of said city of Redondo Beach to a point of intersection thereof with the westerly prolongation of the north line of Huntington Street; thence Easterly along the last described line, and said North line of Huntington Street to the point of intersection thereof with the westerly line of Hawthorne Avenue as same existed December 8, 1925; thence Southerly in a direct line along said South line of Redondo-Torrance Road to a point which is the beginning of a curve in said Re-

dondo-Torrance Road concave Northeasterly, distant 816 feet from the Eastern boundary of said City of Redondo Beach measured on the Westerly extension of said last described straight line South boundary of said Redondo-Torrance Road; thence Westerly along said Westerly extension to the point of intersection thereof with the eastern boundary of said City of Redondo Beach as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; thence Southeast along the Easterly boundary line of the said City of Redondo Beach as said boundary existed December 8, 1925, and the Southerly extension thereof to the point of intersection thereof with the Westerly extension of the Southerly line of Lots 1 to 8 inclusive of Tract No. 454 as recorded in Map Book 15, page 13, Records of Los Angeles County; thence Easterly along the said last described line and the South line of said Lots 1 to 8 inclusive of Tract 454, and the Easterly extension thereof to the Easterly line of the said City of Torrance in a straight line to the Southwesterly corner of Lot 9 of said Tract 454; thence Easterly along the Southerly line of said Lot 9 and the Easterly extension thereof to the Easterly line of Meadow Park Tract as recorded in Book 15, page 60, Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County; thence Southerly in a straight line to the Southwest corner of Lot 117 of Tract No. 2200 as recorded in Map Book 26, records of Los Angeles County; thence Easterly along the Southerly line of said Lot 117 and the Easterly extension thereof to the Southwesterly corner of the boundary of the said City of Torrance as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; thence Northerly, Westerly and Northerly, following the various courses of the City of Torrance as said boundary existed December 8, 1925, to the place of beginning.

SECTION 3. Ballots shall be prepared for said election containing: "Shall Northwest Torrance be annexed to the City of Torrance?" "Yes"; with a voting square to the right of and opposite such proposition.

SECTION 4. For the purpose of holding such special election the precinct and polling place is hereby established at Foreman's Office of Chanslor-Canfield Midway Oil Company's Camp located about 1000 feet south of Redondo-Torrance Road and about 500 feet West of Madrona Avenue.

The election officers for said election shall be as follows: Judges: Margaret Felker and Henry Nathaniel Groenke. Inspector: Reginald F. Springer.

The polling place for such election shall be open for voting continually only during the hours from 6 o'clock A. M. to 7 o'clock P. M. on the date of said election, excepting that any person at the said polling place at closing time may cast his vote as soon as any booths are available for his use.

SECTION 5. In all particulars recited in this ordinance the ballots at such election and the opening and closing of the polls and the holding and conducting of such election shall be in conformity as near as may be, with the laws of this state concerning general

elections except as otherwise provided in the Act of the Legislature of June 11, 1913, hereinbefore referred to.

The City Clerk shall cause notice to be given of such election by the publication of a notice thereof in the Culver City Star, a newspaper of general circulation printed and published outside of the City of Torrance, but in the County of Los Angeles, at least once a week for a period of four successive weeks next preceding the date of election.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published and circulated in the said City of Torrance, and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
