

Charged with violations of the Wright act, Dornick Dallar Chiara paid a fine of \$50; Charles Green and Bert Glaze, of Muroc, pleaded not guilty and, unable to furnish \$500 bond each, are in jail awaiting trial, set for Feb. 5; W. H. Deaton of Santa Monica pleaded not guilty and furnished a \$500 surety bond for his appearance for trial Feb. 24.

ditions under which they live:
3—That it is not the youths who have changed but the conditions under which they live:
4—That the only element which can save society under today's influences from lowering its moral standards is character and moral courage nourished in the home and brought to blossom by sensible direction in school, college, and the world-outside.

THAT all sounds pretty intangible, of course—but morality itself is intangible, and so are the forces and influences that affect it. A host of reformers cloud the horizon, each with a panacea to correct the moral ills with which society is assailed. But the correction formula is in the hand of none.

Woman suffrage, we were told, would improve conditions. It has not. Prohibition was to accomplish the result. It has not. You cannot write moral inhibitions into the law and change human beings.

The remedy is not in the statute books. It is in the hearts and souls of human beings, to be brought out, not by law, not by force, not by preaching, not by writing editorials, but by personal human initiative and pains, conscious and indirect, that will increase home and heart interest, and parental respect and discipline, and erect new moral guide-posts so that the characters and minds of the coming generation will be strengthened to quell the demands of the flesh, overcome modern destructive social influences, and save North America from a reversion to European moral standards.
