Torrance Industrial District Gets Wide Publicity Through Eberle and Riggelman Report

By careful city planning the city of Torrance, the most industrialized community in the southwest area with the exception of Los Angeles and Vernon, has provided a means whereby workers may reside near their places of employment and yet have all the advantages of living in a purely residential area, according to the weekly report of the Eberle and Riggelman Economic Service, authoritative statisticians of Los Angeles. Reports of the Eberle and Riggelman Service are sent to scores of the leading financial, commercial and business houses, where they are used as a basis for business negotiations.

The report on industry was made following an extensive survey of the industrial situation and revealed the fact that there is an unfavorable situation due to the prevailing tendency for workers to live several miles away from their places of employment. This unfavorable situation is, however, rapidly adjusting itself as a result of the planning of communities in advance of their growth for the provision of adequate residential facilities for industrial workers, which has been the case at Torrance, the report states.

See Labor Competition
"If the rapid industrial growth of this section during the last few years may be taken as a criterion of the industrial development which may take place in the next few years," the report says, "a tremendous amount of geographical competition will take place in the labor market, and a manufacturer should govern his choice of a location so that he may take advantage of the most interesting services."

factory of chemical products. Los Angeles itself has extended its industrial activities into many diversified lines. It is almost always possible for a manufacturer to find a location in Southern California and in the immediate Los Angeles area which can furnish the specific attributes essential or desirable for the operation of his industry."
Prices Are Low
The report states that there is almost an unlimited acreage of industrial land on the market in the Los Angeles metropolitan area at the present time, and, considering the facilities offered and attendant fixed charges to be met periodically, the average prices asked are lower than for the same type of acreage in eastern communities.
In concluding their report Eberle and Riggelman state that virtually no acreage in this area is poorly situated with regard to the distribution of chemical products. Los Angeles with its back country and surrounding towns furnish an attractive market, but water transportation is so rapidly and so satisfactorily developing that a manufacturer in Southern California who is favorably situated for the receipt of raw materials can establish himself in the competitive eastern market, the report says.
