ORDINANCE No. 130

An Ordinance Approving and Accepting the Annexation of "Northwest Torrance" to the City of Torrance, a Municipal Corporation, Pursuant to a Special Election Held in Said "Northwest Torrance" on the Question of Annexation to the City of Torrance, on the 9th Day of February, 1926, and Pursuance to, and in Accordance With, the Laws of the State of California.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, a municipal corporation, organized and existing under the laws of the State of California, and situated in the County of Los Angeles, having received a written petition for the annexation of the new territory described therein and hereinafter described, to the City of Torrance, signed by not less than one-fourth (1/4) in number of the qualified electors residing within the territory described therein as shown by the registration of voters of the county of Los Angeles in which county said territory is situated, and asking that such territory be annexed to the City of Torrance; and the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance having called a special election to be held on the 8th day of February, 1926, for submitting to the electors of said territory proposed by such petition to be annexed to said City of Torrance the question whether such territory shall be annexed to, incorporated in, and made a part of the City of Torrance; said special election having been called by Ordinance No. 123 of the City of Torrance adopted on the 4th day of January, 1926; The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance having caused notice to be given of said election by the publication of a notice thereof in a newspaper of general circulation printed, and published outside of the City of Torrance, but in the County of Los Angeles, in which the territory so proposed to be annexed is situated, at least once a week for a period of four consecutive weeks next preceding the date of said election, to-wit: The Culver City Star, on the 5th, 15th, 22nd and 29th days of January, 1926, and the 5th day of February, 1926; said Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance at a regular meeting held on February 15, 1926, being the next regular meeting after the expiration of three days from date of said election, having completed the canvass of the returns of said election on said date, and immediately upon the completion of said canvass said Board of Trustees having caused a record thereof to be made and entered upon its minutes stating the proposition, to-wit: "Shall Northwest Torrance be annexed to the City of Torrance," and showing the whole number of votes cast thereon on said territory proposed to be annexed to the City of Torrance, to-wit: sixty-nine (69) votes, and the number of said votes cast thereon in favor of said annexation, to-wit: sixty-seven (67) votes, and the number of votes cast thereon against said annexation, to-wit: two (2) votes; it having appeared from the canvass of the returns of said election, held in said territory, that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said annexation; and all of the laws applicable to the annexation of said territory to the City of Torrance having been fully complied with, the Board of Trustees hereby approves said annexation and accepts said new territory as a part of the municipal corporation of the City of Torrance, which said new territory is contiguous to the present City of Torrance and is more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the northeast corner of the City of Torrance as of date December 8, 1925, which said point is in the western boundary of the City of Los Angeles, in Western Avenue as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; running thence northerly along the west boundary of the City of Los Angeles to a point thereon three hundred and thirteen and twelve hundredths (313.12) feet north of the southeast corner of Lot Seventy (70) of the McDonald Tract, in the Rancho San Pedro, as per map recorded in Book 15, pages 21 and 22, Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County, California; thence West parallel to the south line of said Lot 70 a distance of Six Hundred Twenty-six and Ninety Hundredths (626.90) feet; thence South parallel to the east line of said Lot 70 to the south line of the said McDonald Tract, in the Rancho San Pedro, as per map recorded in Book 15, pages 21 and 22, Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County; thence west along the said south line of the said McDonald Tract, to the point of intersection thereof with the westerly line of that certain Four Hundred Two and Forty-seven Hundredths (402.47) acre tract, known as Lot 1 of the Maria de los Reyes Dominguez One Thousand Twenty-eight and Sixty-one Hundredths (1028.61) acre allotment, which is part of the Rancho San Pedro allotted to Manuel Dominguez as per Superior Court Case No. 3284, Recorder's filed map No. 135, Records of Los Angeles County; thence southeasterly along the westerly line of said Lot 1 to the point of intersection thereof with the southerly boundary of Beryl Street, as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; thence southwesterly along the southeast boundary of the said Beryl Street to the point of intersection thereof with the east boundary of the City of Redondo Beach, as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; thence southeasterly along the easterly boundary of said City of Redondo Beach to a point of intersection thereof with the westerly prolongation of the north line of Huntington Street; thence east-

erly along the last described line, and said North line of Huntington Street to the point of intersection thereof with the west line of Hawthorne Avenue as same existed December 8, 1925; thence southerly along said west line of Hawthorne Avenue and the southerly prolongation thereof to the point of intersection thereof with the south line of Redondo Torrance Road as same existed December 8, 1925; thence westerly in a direct line along said south line of Redondo-Torrance Road to a point which is the beginning of a curve in said Redondo-Torrance Road concave northeasterly distant 816 feet from the eastern boundary of said City of Redondo Beach measured on the westerly extension of said last described straight line south boundary of said Redondo-Torrance Road; thence northerly along the said westerly extension to the point of intersection thereof with the eastern boundary of said City of Redondo Beach as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; thence southeasterly along the easterly boundary line of said city of Redondo Beach as said boundary existed December 8, 1925, and the southerly extension thereof to the point of intersection thereof with the westerly extension of the southerly line of Lots 1 to 8 inclusive of Tract No. 454 recorded in Book 15, page 13, Records of Los Angeles County; thence easterly along the said last described line and the south line of said Lots 1 to 8 inclusive of Tract 454, and the easterly extension thereof to the easterly line of Ocean Avenue in said Tract 454; thence southerly in a straight line to the southerly corner of Lot 9 of said Tract 454; thence easterly along the southerly line of said Lot 9 and the easterly extension thereof to the easterly line of Meadow Park Tract recorded in Book 15, page 60, Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County; thence southerly in a straight line to the southwest corner of Lot 117 of Tract No. 2200 as recorded in Map Book 26, records of Los Angeles County; thence easterly along the Southerly line of said Lot 117 and the easterly extension thereof to the southeasterly corner of Lot 103 of said Tract 2200, the same being the southwesterly corner of the boundary of the City of Torrance as said boundary existed December 8, 1925; thence northerly, westerly and northerly, following the various courses of the westerly boundary of the City of Torrance as said boundary existed December 8, 1925, to the northwest corner of the said boundary of the City of Torrance; thence easterly along the northerly boundary of said City of Torrance to the northeast corner of said City of Torrance, the place of beginning.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk of the City of Torrance who is the Clerk of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, shall make and certify, under the seal of the City of Torrance, and transmit to the secretary of state of the State of California, a copy of the record of the canvass of the returns of the election in said new territory, together with a statement showing the date of said election in said new territory, and the time and result of the canvass of the returns of said election, and containing a description of said territory; and also a certified copy of this ordinance approving said annexation and accepting said territory as a part of the municipal corporation of the City of Torrance, and giving the date of the passage of said ordinance.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published and circulated in the said City of Torrance, and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
