NEWSBOY HOAX AROUSES FOLKS

There was an earthquake in Asia Minor yesterday morning. Wherefore there was another of almost equal proportions in Torrance.

There is a seismograph at Salt Lake City. It records earth disturbances. It recorded one yesterday.

Two news vendors with leather lungs appeared on the peaceful streets of Torrance.

"Wuxtry," "Bout de earthquake. Salt Lake" wiped out by earthquake. The shouts rang out along the thoroughfares and brought housewives hurriedly from their work, nickels in hand.

Papers purchased from the vendors were the Los Angeles Express, and told of the Asia Minor tremor. The only mention of Salt Lake City was that which said the seismograph at the Utah capital had recorded an earth disturbance 3000 miles away.

Hence the Torrance earthquake, which took the form of scores of complaints to the local police department against the news vendors' fake.

Chief Patterson took the brunt of the shock and vouchsafes the opinion today that the circulation officials of the Los Angeles Express think they are increasing popularity of the paper in Torrance by the hoax, they have another thing coming. And the chief ought to know. He heard what the Torrance folks said.

Ford Road Show Reveals Scope Of Big Industry

Instructive Exhibit in Torrance Today Displays Variety of Products

Everything from a sack of flour to a coupe bed car.

Such was the exposition of Ford products and appliances for Ford cars shown in the Ford Educational Road Show which visited Torrance today.

Led by a calliope operated from the motor which drew the truck on which the instrument was carried, the parade of products of the famous Detroitier passed through the city and became the mecca for hundreds of persons, who inspected the various products on Cabrillo avenue near the Schultz, Peckham and Schmitt overflows.

Among the interesting exhibits was the truck which displayed scores of Ford by-products, giving an idea of the great variety of goods produced by Ford industries. On this truck were all sorts of Ford products, Ford flour, Ford coal and coal by-products, Fordsh, imitation leather, Fordite, and brushes.

An interesting car was the Ford coupe, the seats of which were easily transformed into a bed.

A Schmitt overflows carried a tractor aggregating 10,175 pounds, all hauled by a Ford motor.

Ford cars for every conceivable use were in the exhibition-delivery trucks, tank trucks, school buses, dump trucks, portable air compressors, portable generator.

A sign on the Ford accessories car stated that Ford industries employ 191,948 persons; that the company has 520 acres under roof; that last year 2,103,588 cars, trucks and tractors were produced.

The Ruckstell axle exhibition was interesting. The axle, easily installed, gives the Ford four speeds forward.

All fuel and oil used by the traveling show are products of the Standard Oil Company.
