Vierling Kersey, assistant superintendent of schools, visited Torrance High School Wednesday.


J. H. Worthington of Chestnut street is able to be about again after several days' illness.

HOLDS RECORD




Bernard Awerkamp, 57 years cashier of a Quincy (Ill.) bank, probably holds the record for continuous service with the same financial institution. He is 77.
