Ford Sets New Time for Trip L.A. to Phoenix

Stock Model Crashes Mark Set by 6-Cylinder Car

A Ford Model A stock car, last week broke the record from Los Angeles to Phoenix, via Yuma, according to Charles Schultz of Schultz, Peckham and Schultz, Torrance Ford dealers.

The previous running time, made by a stripped roadster was eight hours and thirty-four minutes. The Ford, carrying all standard equipment and three passengers made the trip in eight hours, fourteen minutes and fifty seconds. After retuning at Phoenix, the same car was driven back to Los Angeles via Blythe and broke that record. The old Blythe route record was ten hours and twenty minutes. The Ford made it in eight hours, forty minutes and ten seconds. The average Ford speed to Phoenix was 88 1/2 miles an hour. The record time was officially by Western and check. Both records were previously held by a six-cylinder car.

The Ford trip was made by Dud Day, Jack Frost and Frank French, Ford dealers in Los Angeles.
