Southland Swings to Hoover Banner

Hoover-for-President clubs throughout all Southern California are being organized with a rapidity that indicates a united effort for one objective, according to a statement by Justus Creamer, editor of the Orange Daily News, who is directing organizations for the southern portion of the state and who declares that California will roll up an unprecedented vote for Hoover at the presidential primaries on the 1st of May. The Hoover-for-President Club of Southern California, under the leadership of President C. C. Teague, with main offices in the Alexandria Hotel, Los Angeles, where all departments are functioning with spontaneity and remarkable enthusiasm. The demand for Hoover in Southern California is so strong that it only needs coordination to present an almost unanimous approval in Republican ranks, declares Mr. Teague, while at the same time Ralph Arnold, chairman of the Republican County Central Committee for Los Angeles County reports that all northern California is swinging in to the Hoover column.

The state will go overwhelmingly for Hoover, without question, Mr. Teague says, but in order that the vote shall be the most impressive that can be obtained, he is urging an intensive campaign for registration in every community. Hoover supporters of whatever party, are reminded that participation at the primaries on May 1st is partisan, and to vote for Hoover the voter must be registered as a Republican.


