A BIBLE IN STONE

Before the written history of a mighty creation cast its enlightening rays across the mental horizon of primeval man, before the Star of Bethlehem rose to illuminate the Christian world with the sublime light of eternal existence, and before the despotic rulers of ancient time erected gigantic pyramidal sepulchres to assuage a fruitless desire for unending homage; the "Great Pyramid of Gizeh" stood at the ancient gateways of tradition.

So it stood, and so it stands, while countless ages roll across that obscure bewildering land of mysticism, the Valley of the Nile, as a sign, and as a witness to all future races and conditions of men, that miracles did not cease at the close of Biblical history.

Covering approximately thirteen acres of ground, and rising to a height of over 450 feet, the Great Pyramid rests upon a rocky elevation about ten miles west of Cairo, at the borders of Egypt; directly in the center of the world, and of a vast semi-circle formed by the several emptying branches of the River Nile; its incomprehensible proportions towering uniformly above all other structures built by, or through the agency of man since the beginning; to be and to remain, until the flame of our distinctive candle of earthly life burns low in the socket; until material things grow dim in the waning light, and oblivion comes slowly, step by step, upon the winding stairway of illimitable duration, and until the luminous curtain of everlasting day is lifted from the portals of a spiritual universe, and the Great White Throne, draped in the silvery robes of faith, of hope, and of charity, rises in scintillating splendor from out the veil of celestial glory.

Then will come a fulfillment of the prophecy which saith: "In that day shall there be an altar to the Lord in the midst of the land of Egypt, and a pillar at the border thereof to the Lord." Is. 19-19.

During the year 1799, while the conquering legions of Napoleon swarmed unchecked, through the fertile valleys of the Nile, this military genius, also saw in the Great Pyramid, unmistakable evidence of the supernatural, and caused the savants, who constituted a part of his forces, to prepare descriptions, maps, and designs of it. This data was afterwards compiled in a comprehensible and elaborate manner and now forms a valuable addition to the accumulated information on the subject.

Posterity owes to General Howard Vyse, a true soldier, a great scholar, and an able writer, a debt of everlasting gratitude; for it was he, more than any other, who, in the interest of science, undertook extensive exploration operations in the Great Pyramid. Both his time and a large personal fortune were devoted to the work, in the year 1817. Finally, with the help of over five score able assistants he succeeded in cutting an opening into the masonry above the so-called "King's Chamber," and exposed the wonderful cylindrical air passages; he was also instrumental in demonstrating, beyond a question or a doubt, the astronomical and tripartite principles of the pyramid's construction, and laid the foundation for the most stupendous revelation in the history of man.

Plato tells us that God perpetually geometrizes; Come saw mind composed of supernatural, metaphysical and positive degrees of powers; Burks found an equality between geology and mythology and arranged the latter in accordance with the triplicity of the earth's composition; the chemist diminishes substance to repulsion, attraction, and vitality.

The Supreme Architect of the Great Pyramid of Gizeh built into it a mathematically exact replication of the spiritual and physical universe, in the form of a triangle, and achieved, among other remarkable results, a squaring of the circle.

Physicists and scientists have so far discovered, within its historic precincts the emblematical cavity of everlasting fire; the

chamber of the "Ark of the Covenant" with its mysterious granite coffer; the narrow cylinder-like entrance from above, which Sir John Herschel believes, pointed to some distant polar star at the time the pyramid was erected, and many other almost inconceivable features about this supernatural structure of mundane existence.

Thus, in the pristine shadows of an enlightened period, did its inspired builders, set up a monument to long after time; replete with the creative wonders of a super-intelligence; a geometrical record of all the ages; a spiritual cradle of the beginning and an immaculate conception of the end.

Touring California

Travel Notes of Interest and Western Highway Information Furnished by the National Automobile Club

The Beaumont and Banning districts are now the mecca for hundreds of motorists desiring to see the almond orchards in bloom, according to the Touring Department of the National Automobile Club. There are approximately 1200 acres of almond trees in bloom at this time and the country is a riot of color and perfume. These are the earliest trees to bloom in the spring and will be supplanted in March by the cherry trees. There are three routes available in the distance, while near at hand, bordering the road, are many almond orchards in bloom. The real climb begins at a point three miles distant from Banning, and the road begins to ascend grades ranging from five to twelve per cent. The road is of narrow dirt and is in fairly good condition but there are many sharp turns and motorists should sound horn approaching each turn. On the lower levels manzanita, greasewood, cat's claw and several varieties of sage are plentiful, while on the higher levels are found splendid forests of pine, with yellow variety predominating. In these forests are many beautiful campsites, supervised by the government. On the western slope of San Jacinto will be found several mountain streams in which several thousand rainbow trout are planted each season. These streams, owing to the ruggedness of the mountains, are very fast flowing and numerous difficulties to fishermen. Camp fire permits are required at all campsites and are obtainable at Idyllwild or at any Ranger Station. Owing to the fire hazard, this order is rigorously enforced. It is also necessary for the motorist camper to have an axe and shovel in his possession while camping. It is doubtful if there is a trip in Southern California of corresponding length which will give to the motorist as many beautiful views as are obtained in the 32 miles beyond Banning and Idyllwild. The road reaches an altitude of 7400 feet at its highest point, and rivals in beauty the famous "Rim of the World" drive in the San Bernardino mountains.

The following report of road conditions from Banning to Idyllwild via the Banning-Idyllwild Grade is furnished by the Touring Department of the National Automobile Club: Leaving Banning, an old oiled road, somewhat chucky, is had for only one mile, followed by a dirt road which winds along the base of the mountains. Beautiful views of snow-capped Baldy and San Geronimo are had in the distance, while near at hand, bordering the road, are many almond orchards in bloom. The real climb begins at a point three miles distant from Banning, and the road begins to ascend grades ranging from five to twelve per cent. The road is of narrow dirt and is in fairly good condition but there are many sharp turns and motorists should sound horn approaching each turn. On the lower levels manzanita, greasewood, cat's claw and several varieties of sage are plentiful, while on the higher levels are found splendid forests of pine, with yellow variety predominating. In these forests are many beautiful campsites, supervised by the government.
