

Dodge Brothers Production Gains
 Factory output of Dodge Brothers passenger cars and Graham brothers trucks during the month of February from the plants of Dodge Brothers, Inc., in the United States and Canada, according to preliminary figures released by the factory in Detroit today was 20,727 units, a gain of 25.9 per cent over February last year when the total was 16,46.

The gain over January this year when 12,764 units were shipped is 62.3 per cent.

Los Angeles Leads with Concrete Streets
 "Los Angeles holds first place among cities in the United States for quantity of Portland Cement concrete streets," says George E. Warren, assistant general manager of the Portland Cement Association, Chicago. With 562 miles of this type of pavement, it has set a record which other large cities are out to equal. With a considerable lead over the nearest competitor, it will probably hold first place by continuing the present improvement program.

How long one lives after fifty is influenced by how wisely one eats before fifty. "Everything tastes good" is not a safe guide for adults in the prime of life. The appetite of a boy must be accompanied by the activities of a boy. The adult's sport is too often taken by proxy, but his food is not. Reservoirs of vitality can be greatly depleted if the grown-up does not realize that he is not eating for growth but for efficient maintenance. The goose stuffed with fattening foods and not exercised grows a huge liver for our pate de foie gras delicacy. The internal human organs often suffer irreparably from unwise eating during the years when all seems well.

An adult who leads a fairly active life can easily have his needs of food and appetite balanced. When activity is little and appetite big, a better balance must be struck. Just enough foods should be eaten to supply power for a day's work and not store unneeded fat, and only enough protein consumed to keep the muscles and tissues in good repair. Patronize the meat shops conservatively, the pastry shops wisely and the green grocer liberally. Indulge in frequent and generous drinks of pure, cold water. The empty feeling which leads to unwise between-meal eating will be relieved and the kidney aided. Calories count between meals as well as at meals. The tempting sundaes equal several servings of boiled potatoes. Clear, hot soups at dinner reduce the keep edge of hunger, stimulate digestive juices without adding many calories. Careful checking of weight and regular physical examinations are the only safe guide to the adult who feels "equal to any food." 


