

## Two Elections Called In Harbor City

### Residents Are Voting Today On County Water Works Bonds

Harbor City residents were today voting upon the project to issue bonds under a county water works district system, for the purpose of supplying water to that territory in place of the present system owned by Harbor City.

On March 21, they will again take part in an election on a proposition to form a city water works district.

Owing to the fact that two elections have been called there exists considerable doubt in the minds of the Harbor City residents what the status of affairs will be. That is to say, it is questioned whether, if the county bond election carries, it will be necessary to proceed with the city election.

Meanwhile, a representative of the Great West Utilities Corporation, a water concern, is on the ground, waiting to learn the outcome of the election, or elections, with the intention, if neither county or city district is authorized, to present to Harbor City a proposition to purchase its present water system, and replace it with their own privately owned property.
