### Sepulveda Blvd. Annual Meeting

#### Association to Gather at Redondo Beach Friday Night

The annual meeting of the South Sepulveda Boulevard Association will be held in the Council Chambers in the City Hall at Redondo Beach, Friday evening, Mar. 23, at 8 o'clock.

The election of the executive committee to serve for the ensuing year will be held. General reports from the various sectors of the highway will be made which will graphically indicate the substantial progress which has been made during the past few months toward the construction of this great major roadway. R. F. McClellan, chairman of the board of supervisors, and supervisor of the Fourth District, will be the principal speaker.

The South Sepulveda Boulevard Association is a voluntary civic group which was organized at the instance of the Los Angeles County Regional Planning Commission over two years ago, and has been a very potent factor in the development of preliminary proceedings in connection with one of Southern California's greatest utility highway projects embraced in the regional plan.

The road when completed will form an important connecting link in the U. S. Coast Highway No. 101. This link stretches from San Fernando on the north, through Sepulveda Canyon, thence south through Sawtelle, Culver City, El Segundo, and the west coast beaches, following the alignment of El Camino Real, through Redondo, Torrance, and Long Beach, where it will again tap the existing coast highway at Redondo Beach. A direct harbor connection is effected through the south fork of the road east of Redondo going through Lomita and Harbor City to Wilmington.

The officers during the past year have been Major J. Carl Shindler, president; E. D. Goode of Mar Vista, J. A. Smith of Long Beach, and Major D. O. Rochfort of Culver City, vice-presidents, and Carl L. Hyde of Torrance, secretary-treasurer.

### District Grads Boost Library

#### Floyd E. Bradley Heads Local Committee Seeking U. S. C Funds

INGLEWOOD, (Special)—Interest of alumni of the University of Southern California living in the South Bay and Harbor Districts in the efforts to raise funds to build the University library and gymnasium was heightened Tuesday evening when a group of graduates from all sections of the district gathered at the Rainbow Inn here to discuss plans for their participation in the campaign. With Kenneth Clarey and Mrs. Mildred Bush, both of Inglewood, as men and women's chairmen for this district and with chairmen appointed for every town in this section having five or more alumni, the work is to go ahead at the same time similar organizations are being set up in every part of the state.

At Tuesday night's dinner local chairmen were appointed, instructions were delivered to the workers, and Gwynn Wilson, general manager of the Associated Students of the University of California, told of the pressing needs of the University for better library and gymnasium facilities and for endowment for the work of the alumni office activities. It was explained that more than 8,000 graduates of the University all over the United States and in foreign lands were being enlisted in this alumni canvass, which is a part of the University's semi-centennial building and endowment campaign. The ultimate objective of the University authorities is the raising of \$10,000,000 by 1930 when the institution will celebrate the 50th anniversary of its founding.

Two chairmen, a man and a woman, are to be appointed in each town in this district to direct the canvass of the alumni in their localities. ### Santa Fe Deeds Streets to City

#### Gives Back More Area Than City Vacated in New Improved Tract

(Continued from Page 1) size and was dependent upon other conditions as well for its completion, we originally thought it would not be possible to deliver this deed before the latter part of this year and we so advised your Honorable Body. However, we are very glad to be able to deliver it about a year sooner than we expected.

"It may be of interest to you to know that by vacating certain streets, which had never been used or improved as such, you made it possible for us to lay out a much more practical industrial tract than could have been otherwise laid out, and that as a result we are now turning back into streets an acreage two and one third times as large in proportion to the area you vacated, in addition to which this relatively large area now contains high grade public improvements which have cost us over \$125,000 for the facilities in the streets only.

"In presenting this document we wish to thank you for the co-operative attitude your City Government has maintained. Had it not been for this it is very doubtful if at this time we could have carried out this constructive program, which, we hope, will benefit Torrance as much as ourselves.

"We trust the attitude you have consistently manifested will be continued, because that is a large factor in promoting the best interests of the subject most vital to your future growth—the bringing of industries to your city and encouraging their development. We anticipate the location of substantial industries in Torrance which will greatly add to the prosperity of the City and its inhabitants, so long as you keep up this same spirit and work toward that end.


