

## Edison Officer Honored Three Times For Service

For the third time within three years, a signal honor has been given George Clinton Ward, executive vice-president of the Southern California Edison Company, who received the honorary degree of Doctor of Science at Oberlin College on June 19. This degree has been awarded only eight times

by Oberlin and was conferred on Dr. Ward in recognition of his work in applying the results of scientific research to the field of electrical and mechanical engineering.

One year ago, Dr. Ward was given the honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering by the University of Southern California. In 1925 he was the recipient of a bronze medalion, which was presented by the United States Chamber of Commerce upon the completion of the famous Florence Lake tunnel in the High Sierra. Dr. Ward began his engineering career in New York State on various projects. As chief engineer for the Raquette Lake Railway, he attracted the attention of Collis P. Huntington and as a logical associate became associated with the late Henry E. Huntington when the latter began his work as the Empire Builder of Southern California. Since 1900 Dr. Ward has been interested in electrical projects in Southern and Central California, the Big Creek development of the Edison Company being his best-known work.

To obtain an English Cottage type of house with an economical floor plan, one that has no lost space in the second story, gives an ideal combination. It combines beauty and economy, two most essential factors in the design of the modern American home. The architects have, in the house illustrated herewith, obtained both of these essential qualities to a very marked degree, as a study of the accompanying illustration will show. The construction is stucco over frame, although brick veneer could be used with very good effect. The inclosed sun porch is a delightful little room that serves also as an entrance vestibule. The entire plan layout is direct and compact, with not an inch of space lost. Three good bedrooms and a bath together with ample closets complete the second floor, while on the third floor there is space for an additional room if required. A cellar under the entire house provides the space for the laundry, the heater and such. A lot with a frontage of 40 feet would give good free space, but not allow for a driveway. With a driveway on one side a frontage of 45 feet would give a good setting. Complete working plans and specifications of this house may be obtained for a nominal sum from the Building Editor.
