Local Danes Talk to Copenhagen at \$63.75 for 3 Min.

Transatlantic telephone service between Southern California and Copenhagen, the capital of Denmark through London will be opened Friday, June twenty-ninth. The service on the American side includes all of the United States and Cuba and thirty-seven principal cities of Canada. Copenhagen with a population estimated at seven hundred seventy-five thousand has a total of approximately one hundred twenty-six thousand telephones. Denmark is the seventh European country to be connected with America by telephone. The over sea circuits will be in operation from two-thirty A. M. until six P. M. Pacific Standard Time. The cost of a call between Southern California and Copenhagen is sixty-three dollars seventy-five cents for the first three minutes and twenty-one dollars twenty-five cents for each additional minute. The extension to Copenhagen puts the United States in communication with ten foreign countries. The service in Europe includes all points in Great Britain and Germany, Paris, and important cities in Belgium, Holland, and Sweden.
