It is, in its better and its worse versions, everywhere, and, while those that border on the "worse" side are dimly unpleasant spectacles to see, those that are really smart are delightful examples of the fine arts of tailoring and dressmaking.

The one Vogue has chosen and sketched is shown without its coat, in order to emphasize the blouse. The coat, however, is a collarless, finger-tip jacket of suede cloth, cut on classically simple lines. The skirt, too, is of suede cloth and has two kick pleats in the front. But the blouse is of silk crepe, and, besides its softly cascading jabot, it has added femininity in a swathed girde, uplifted at one side. The most unusual thing about it, however, and surely the newest, is its color—black. In this instance, it is worn as the dark note of a dull red ensemble, but it would be equally smart with cinnamon-brown, slate-gray or lacquer-red.

"An Admirer" asks Vogue to suggest a frock for street and afternoon wear, which will be flattering to her twenty-three years and also to her average, but not too slim height. She suggests that we show one of navy-blue chiffon velvet with lines that do not adhere to the tallness.

A rhinestone pin at the shoulder or the waist-line would heighten its afternoon formality.
