

Disgruntled Folks to Launch Battle Over Alondra Park

HAWTHORNE—While action in demonstrating itself in the fight to relieve the Alondra Park assessment district of its burden in the filing of a suit in the next few days in the superior court, which will endeavor to nullify the action of the county board of supervisors in acquiring this piece of property. According to attorneys who have been delving into the matter there are nineteen allegations upon which they base their contentions, among which is stressed the fact that the persons affected in the assessment district had no opportunity of presenting their opinions or desires to the board of supervisors. In other words the whole matter was put over in a very secretive manner, beneficial to a few and extremely costly to the district as a whole. Alondra Park has long been a sore spot in the side of those living in the district covered by its assessments. Tax bills received this fall carry amounts ranging from 60 cents to \$1.40 per hundred on the assessed valuation, this representing only the interest on the principal, which amounts to more than one million dollars. O. T. Johnson, Jr., of the Johnson Estate informs this paper that his organization is paying the park assessments under protest, and suggests that others of the quality do likewise. If the suit to nullify the action of the supervisors is successful his money would then be refunded.—Hawthorne-Lawndale Journal.
