THAT CAR OF YOURS

When your battery appears to be weak, it is a good plan to examine the terminals for corrosion.

Always make it a policy to use high grade oil; it will tend to cut down the repair bill, as well as extend the life of the engine.

When brakes grab, or wind-up, it is probably due to greasy lining which has become burnt.

Squeaks, which are so annoying, will often be remedied by oiling the spring shackles.

On making mountain trips in winter, always make it a point to carry a set of tire chains.

Turning corners too fast will

cause more wear on the tires than the use of brakes.

Spark plugs, although given little attention, should be cleaned of carbon and adjusted frequently.

When the radiator hose becomes soft, install a new one, as the inside layer of rubber will peel off and stop up the radiator tubes.

Drain and flush the radiator frequently by clamping the top hose together. Insert the water hose or air pressure in the bottom of the radiator. This will clean out the sediment collected, and will help to insure better circulation.

Racing your motor in low speed at any time is poor practice, but it is particularly bad when pulling a long grade. The correct thing to do is to use whichever speed possible, without causing the motor to labor.
