Banning Takes Four Basket Ball Games From Torrance

Faculty Axe Kills Lightweight Chances; Varsity Trounced

Nine minutes before the lightweight game on Friday, December 6, three first string players, Lock, Ludwig and Kissinger were declared ineligible. The B squad went on the floor with a patched, but fighting lineup, and went down to defeat after four quarters of furious play by a 19-13 count.

At half time everything looked dark for the home town boys with the score 10-3 and Banning out in front. Pullman, right forward for T. H. S., was responsible for three points by tallying a field goal and a free throw. Chamberlin of Banning scored two field goals and a free throw. Captain Severson tallied one field goal. Maki tossed one from the charity line and Turley ended the scoring for the first half with two more via the free throw route.

In the last half Torrance made a desperate rally but to no avail. Eckerly of T. H. S. tallied two field goals and two free throws, while Captain, Steppy and Higgins each added a point with free throws. Chamberlin made two field goals Gutierrez and Madio a field goal apiece and Maquena tossed one from the charity line just before the game ended at 19-13.

A superior Banning quintet took the measure of the Industrial City five by a 32-25 count at the high school gymnasium.

Torrance tallied seven points in the second stanza, but Banning was well warmed up by this time and were finding holes in the Torrance defense. As a result they ran up twelve points to make the score at half time 18-9.

After the lemons and sugar had been parsed around in the rest period before the final half, Torrance slowed down the Banning scoring machine to seven points, while tallying three points for themselves. Score at end of third quarter 25-12.

The last period was a hectic one, with Torrance making a strong bid for victory by tallying thirteen points. Banning was held to seven points and, if the game had lasted longer T. H. S. would have forged ahead.

In the first three quarters Torrance had a hard time finding the basket and seemed bewildered by the Banning attack, but when the last period started they came to life and made a desperate rally which was nipped in the bud.
