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

Baskets of pink and white carnations adorned the high altar, and a basket of poinsettias was placed at each statue.

At the first strains of Lohengrin's Wedding March, played by Miss Mary Scallen, the bride entered on the arm of her father, who gave her away. She was dressed in a lovely fitted gown of egg shell satin with long sleeves, fine lace, ruffled trim and tulle constituted the trimmings. She wore a veil of tulle, coronet style, which was held in place by a wreath of orange blossoms. Her only ornament was a necklace of pearls and crystals. The bride's bouquet was a shower of pink rosebuds and white sweetpeas.
