

PLAYGROUND PLANS SNOW CARNIVAL

Camp Seelye at L. A. Playground Plans Huge Winter Spectacle and Sports

As the first winter sports event of the present season in Southern California, a huge snow carnival will be held at Camp Seelye, Los Angeles municipal playground in the San Bernardino mountains, on Saturday and Sunday, January 18 and 19—(if it snows).

Such was the announcement this week of the Los Angeles Playground and Recreation Commission, under whose direction the carnival is to take place. Plans for one of the biggest carnivals of this kind ever attempted in the Southland are being pushed to completion.

Under the direction of ski-ing experts of international experience, ski-jumps are being built at Seelye for jumpers at junior, amateur and professional distances, and the ski events of the carnival are expected to produce some spectacular thrills for the crowds. Finishing touches are also being put on a large oval ice-skating rink, on which hockey matches and skating exhibitions will be staged. A steep, boarded toboggan chute has been finished on the mountain slope, and is beginning at sixty miles an hour
