Wets and Drys In Showdown At Convention

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 22. (UP)—Republican wets and drys were marshaling their forces in Washington today in preparation for an impending "show-down" on the prohibition issue at the Republican state convention, to be held in Bellingham on May 24.
Encouraged by the results of The Literary Digest's "dry poll," which showed this state to be definitely in the wet and moist column, Republican wet leaders have served notice that they will force the issue before the convention and demand adoption of a platform favoring modification or repeal of the prohibition laws with government control of liquor.
This pronouncement was met with a statement by B. N. Hicks, state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, that his organization will tackle all wet or moist candidates and "drive them out of politics and out of the state."
The Anti-Saloon League is better organized than ever before and so powerful that it will control the next Legislature," Hicks said. "The great majority of legislative districts are also controlled by us and we will come up after the next election with the greatest majority we ever had."
On the other hand, advocates of repeal declare they have met with support beyond their fondest expectations, with prominent political leaders espousing the wet cause in increasing numbers. The state of Washington is one of the pioneer states in prohibition. It was one of the first to enact the Volstead law.
The action taken by the Republican convention in Bellingham will be doubly significant, as it will be tantamount to either party endorsement or rejection of Sen. Wesley L. Jones, ardent Republican dry of this state and author of the famous "Five-and-Ten" law.
Appeals of some party delegates to avoid discussion of prohibition at the forthcoming convention in the interest of party harmony were greeted with no consideration.
"It is strange how many persons are suddenly interested in party harmony," said Ralph Horr, chairman of the powerful King county Republican committee, which includes Seattle. "The issue will be met squarely. There will be no hedging or side-advances. The convention is timely enough to cause some unexpected upheavals among the ranks of candidates for office in the primaries in September and the general election in November. All members of the House of Representatives, more than one-half of the state Senate, all county officials, many municipal officers, three justices of the State Supreme Court and all five United States congressmen are to be elected this fall."
"With this encouragement of a Republican wet platform and continued wet majority for this state in The Literary Digest's poll, wet leaders are confident of inducing prominent men having a large political following to climb on the bandwagon to oppose the incumbent drys. The wet cause has suffered heretofore from lack of suitable political timber to place the campaign on a straight wet and dry issue.
The drys sustained a severe blow recently when Guy E. Kelly, of Tacoma, powerful political leader of western Washington, former honorary national committeeman, announced his intention of supporting the wet cause.
"The time has come," Kelly declared, "when the Republican party must take the hypocrisy out of politics and assume the leadership for repeal or modification of the state and federal liquor laws. The time must be an early one at the convention and I intend to see that it is."
