

Vacation Time At L. A. Municipal Camps



Camp Seeley, Camp Radford, and Camp High Sierra, the mountain playgrounds operated by the L. A. Department of Playground and Recreation, will provide wholesome recreational vacations for thousands of families from June to September, at low rates made possible by municipal management.

Where to go for that 1930 vacation, a question of increasing importance to thousands of families as summer days draw nearer, will be answered for many people today by the announcement of the Los Angeles Playground and Recreation Department that reservations now being taken for outings at three municipal mountain camps, Seeley, Radford, and High Sierra.

For those who prefer the mountains as the scene of their vacation, these public playgrounds again offer the happy recreational outings at low cost which thousands enjoyed last year. Because of municipal management, these three camps are able to provide young and old with all-inclusive vacations on a non-profit basis which brings such excursions within the reach of people in all walks of life.

Camp Seeley, in the San Bernardino mountains, will begin its summer season on June 8. Because of its compact arrangements, comfortable facilities, and the varied outdoor activities of this playground, its appeal has become widespread as a family vacation camp. Rustic cabins, swimming pool, and the community recreation center with dancing, entertainment, and story-hours around the central fireplace result in friendly social evenings help to make outings at Seeley of interest to persons of all ages. While the camp features one and two weeks outings on the American plan, a number of housekeeping cottages and an auto camp take care of those who prefer this type of accommodation.

Hiking and horseback riding are two of the most popular sports at Camp Radford, which will open on June 15. Located in one of the most picturesque regions of the San Bernardino mountains, the playground is a hub from which trails to numberless points of interest radiate. On the slope of a tall ridge which looks across the great San Geronimo (Old Grayback), a vast country of forests, streams, and mountains rolls away from the edge of this playground. Itself 6000 feet above sea level, Camp Radford is a playground of 1000 acres, with a variety of camp recreations. A community dining hall, a children's playground, and a social center building bring vacationists at Radford together in friendly companionship.

Camp High Sierra, which starts its season on June 22, is the most distant of the Los Angeles municipal camps. Located in the Mammoth Lakes region of the High Sierras, in Mono County, the playground has been built in a place where "California's Alps" may be most fully enjoyed. Surrounded on all sides by great mountain peaks, towering to a height of 13,000 feet and more, and within easy reach of rushing torrents and clear blue lakes, this 6000 foot high camp forms a center from which excursions into the surrounding territory are made. Fishermen, hikers, outdoor people of all kinds each year find this camp a comfortable place to make their headquarters for a visit in the High Sierras.

Registrations for outings to take place any time during the summer are now being made at a special camp headquarters established by the Playground and Recreation Department in the Los Angeles City Hall. Due to improvements in service and greater choice in the matter of vacation dates, a larger attendance is expected during 1930 than last year. Early reservations, for this reason, have been advised by municipal camp officials for those planning to spend their vacations at Camp Seeley, Camp Radford, or Camp High Sierra.

Although primarily for the use of Los Angeles residents many guests are received at these camps from other Southern California cities, and numerous registrations from this and other districts are expected.

Hollywood Riviera Clubhouse To Be Completed August 15th

Magnificent \$200,000 Structure in Torrance Will Compare Favorably With Any Clubhouse in Southern California.

Torrance can soon boast of a clubhouse that will compare with the finest on the Pacific Coast, it was learned today, when announcement was made that date of completion for the \$200,000 Hollywood Riviera community clubhouse has been set for August 15, according to Fred W. Marlow, executive vice-president of Clifford F. Reid, Inc., developers of the residential community adjoining Palos Verdes on the South Santa Monica Bay in Torrance.

Cement retaining walls, swimming pool walls, structural steel and wood frame work has already been completed, and at this stage of construction an idea may be gained of what Mark Danieles, the architect, has planned for what is expected to be one of the outstanding club structures on the Southern California coast line. Occupying a slightly elevated site overlooking 1000 feet of bathing beach, the rambling two-story Mediterranean type building, surmounted by a four-story tower, will command an unobstructed panoramic view of the entire south Santa Monica bay area.

"With the advent of the summer swimming season close at hand, the crowded conditions of public bathing beaches will again be strikingly emphasized," said Marlow. "As the population continues to increase the time will not be far distant when a considerable portion of the public will be denied the use of the ocean for swimming."

"A fully equipped and furnished clubhouse, fronting on 1000 feet of private bathing beach, all of which is owned jointly by every property owner in Hollywood Riviera, naturally makes an appeal to those who appreciate the advantages of a home site near the ocean. This feature, coupled with the phenomenal increases in value of property situated on the Southern California coast line, has combined to stimulate wide interest in Hollywood Riviera."

Navy Plans Rites Aboard Battleship

For the second time in the history of Los Angeles Harbor, Naval Memorial Day Ceremonies will be held on board a first-line battleship, with various patriotic organizations participating. These services are to be held at 10 a.m. May 30th, under the auspices of Navy Post No. 378, American Legion of Los Angeles, and Commander J. P. Wood Chapter No. 2, Dewey Congressional Medal Men's Association of Sawtelle.

Information was received yesterday (May 16) by William J. Stirling, National Commander of the Dewey Men's Association, that the Secretary of the Navy has designated the U. S. S. Idaho as the naval vessel on which these exercises are to be held. A committee appointed by Commander Stirling and Commander Burton L. Hunter of Navy Post of the Legion is now actively engaged in making arrangements, and details as to the program will be announced later.

The program will include naval band music, songs and a few short addresses; and at noon during the firing of a 21 minute gun salute, floral offerings to the naval dead will be cast on the waters from the decks of the Idaho and from a squadron of naval planes.

The Dewey Men and Naval Legionnaires plan to continue this as an annual service for Los Angeles.

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Housewife's Job Is Most Dangerous of Occupations

Speaking of dangerous occupations, consider the humble housewife. Crossing a street in heavy traffic a hundred times safer than cooking over a gas stove, sweeping the floors, or mopping up the bathroom.

Injuries in the home account for the largest number of non-fatal accidental injuries in the United States, and for a large proportion of such injuries in California.

According to facts presented to the State Board of Health, approximately 46 per cent of the injuries are caused by various nursing organizations arise out of domestic accidents; 45 per cent occurred in public places and 9 per cent while the injured person was at work.

"Watch your step" might well be the motto of all who work in the home, as nearly half the domestic injuries were due to falls, on or down stairs, over chairs, in bathrooms, (often on a cake of soap), on on rugs, adventure with the domestic stovetop, and falls out windows.

Next came burns and scalds. In 28 per cent of home injuries involving nursing care arose out of stove, grate, lamp and match hazard. The humble teakettle, wash boiler and wash tub played their part in causing injury in the home.

The unguarded, or misused kitchen knife accounted for 12 per cent of the non-fatal injuries in the home. With all the progress made in modernizing the home, especially in kitchen equipment, there still occurs a lamentable toll of injury and death.

"The time has come when the domestic injury hazard should be submitted to examination in the same spirit and with the same thoroughness with which hazards in industry and public places have been approached," the report said.

Of the injuries in public places, the automobile accounted for 46 per cent, falls and slips on the street resulted in 28 per cent and street, car and railroad injuries, 7 per cent.
