

Why The English



THE SUSSEX HOUSE H-126 A short trip through rural England leaves a distinct impression of the romantic architecture on one's mind—for their houses and their landscape—their barns and their countryside are one—all seem to belong to the same family—and a happy family. None of their buildings jar the sense of serenity—they dot but do not blot the picture—and this cannot be said of many of the rural sections of America some of which are sadly lacking in harmony and devoid of architectural character. In this country many of the houses are designed without proper regard to their setting, often awkward and stilted, built of materials foreign to the locality and out of key while in England their houses appear to grow right up out of the soil. The low, squat cottages of England with their expansive and irregular roofs, their interesting dormers and variety in chimneys, their varied uses of the different materials and the delightfully informal way in which they handle the design cannot but appeal to all lovers of the beautiful. But the practical side crops out—what about the plan layout? The Sussex is a Modern American adoption of the English Cottage theme. It schedules: Basement: (no plan of which is shown). A large recreation room, laundry, cold storage, heater and coal space. First floor: Entrance vestibule with coat closet, living room, dining room, kitchen, two bed rooms a bath and closets. Second floor: Two bed rooms, a bath, ample closets and storage space. Selling heights: Basement, seven feet; first floor, eight feet; second floor, eight feet. Exposure: The plans as shown are for a lot facing South or West. For a lot facing North or East the plans should be reversed. Lot size: House frontage, 27 feet; side clearance, left 9 feet, right 8 feet; lot frontage, minimum 44 feet. Construction: Frame with stucco finish, brick front; roof, slate; foundation, concrete; windows, steel casements in special arrangements. Interiors: Floors, wood for the main finish; walls, plaster; kitchen, plaster; bath rooms, tile; steam heat, gas and electric wiring. Cubiture: 24,800 cu. ft.
