EXPOSES BUNK ON FAT CURES

State Health Officer Warns Public Against Injury By Use of Reducing "Cures."

SACRAMENTO, Calif., May 29 (UP)—If you're getting overweight, don't make the mistake of taking pills, powders or using bath salts to reduce.

A good workout on the tennis or handball court, a round of golf or an hour in the swimming pool is worth all the "anti-fat" remedies in the world.

This warning, which applies to yesterday's flapper who still loves chocolate malted milks, or the young business executive who is growing thicker about the waist, comes from Professor M. E. Jaffa, director of the Bureau of Food and Drugs of the California Department of Public Health.

Not even the smoking of certain brands of cigarettes, despite their advertising, can reduce avariciousness, Professor Jaffa says. But in drugs in particular to which his warning applies.

"Promoters of so-called obesity remedies and fat reducing cures," a statement from his office says, "are attempting to influence fat people to spend money for worthless or dangerous preparations. The advertisements appeal to the vanity of persons who wish to regain slim, graceful figures or those who can no longer do their work efficiently."

Some of these preparations contain thyroid and laxatives. It is pointed out, thyroid should never be administered, except under direction of a physician. Instances have been recorded by the state department where death has resulted from an overdose of a preparation containing thyroid. Some of these remedies contain poke root, a poisonous drug, while others contain nothing that could have the slightest effect in reducing weight.

"The promoters of one preparation assert that it secures most marvelous results by a process of elimination of foods without digestion," continues the warning. "These people guarantee the reduction of a pound a day. If this preparation did what its makers claim, it would probably eliminate any need of digestion in the future."

"One preparation consists principally of ordinary soap. The idea is to apply it locally with friction and thus remove the fat where it may be in excess. A still more clever scheme provides chemicals to add to the bath. These chemicals form a sort of curd in the water after the patient has bathed. This curd, the advertisement states, is fat and surplus tissue removed from the body."

Professor Jaffa is ordering all such drugs removed from the market as rapidly as he finds them to be falsely labeled.

Take a Short Trip And Drive Slowly For Memorial Day

SACRAMENTO.—Heavy automobile travel over all main state highways in California over the coming Memorial Day week-end was predicted today by the Division of Motor Vehicles with increased traffic hazard and possible increase of motor mishaps.

Reports received by the California Highway Patrol from the various traffic districts gave indications that thousands of Californians will use the three-day period to make long trips to mountain and coast resorts or to visit friends living in distant parts of the state. The promise of perfect weather gave this prospect added emphasis.

Pointing to the fact that the highways are likely to be congested, the Division's Safety Department issued a warning urging all who contemplate such trips to drive carefully.

Traffic officers will maintain especial vigilance at known danger spots on the highways to cut down accidents. They will be on the watch particularly for the speeder and reckless driver.

"Don't try to drive too fast," the division's warning said. "Plan a shorter trip and you'll enjoy it more, drive more carefully, and come home feeling rested."
