

HUSBAND AND WIFE ARE FATALLY BURNED IN GAS EXPLOSION

Leak in Pipe Believed Cause of Disaster Which Takes Two Lives and Razes Home.

Frank Oberle, who operated a small lunch stand at the corner of 165th and Main streets, arose shortly after four a.m. yesterday morning and walked into the kitchen to light the fire under a pot of muck for the chickens. He lit a match, and a terrific explosion followed, rocking the houses for blocks around. Huge plate glass windows from the front of the restaurant were thrown into the roadway, screens across the street, and window shades as far as a block away.

Mr. Oberle had arisen to assist her husband, and both she and Mr. Oberle were fatally burned by the explosion and the ensuing fire.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Straumer and Mildred and Elwood Straumer, 16512 Main, heard the explosion and rushed out. Mildred was first to arrive at the scene of the explosion, and seeing the smoke pouring from the building, she ran from window to door calling frantically "Come out, come out."

Her brother Elwood arrived next, and he broke in the screen door and pulled the burned bodies from the house. Mr. and Mrs. Oberle were taken to the Straumer home to await the ambulance. Mean-

while the restaurant, which had sleeping quarters in the rear, was burning rapidly, and was soon burned to the ground.

Mr. Oberle, 60, sat patiently in a chair waiting and praying. Mrs. Oberle, who was in great pain, moaned constantly and cried "I can't stand it, I can't stand it." The couple was brought to the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital, where it was found that they suffered extensive burns over their entire bodies.

A daughter, Marie Oberle of Shreveport, La., and two sons, Frank and Leon of Little Rock, Arkansas, were notified and they left immediately for Torrance.

Mr. Oberle died at 12 noon, and his wife joined him a few moments later.

A leaky gas pipe is believed to have been the cause of the tragedy. Investigation will be made today at the coroner's inquest to be held at the Whittington mortuary in Gardena.
