WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?

Noteworthy Garden Flowers
The modern garden is planned to include flowers for many purposes—they are a necessary part.
"One of the flowers that provides color to the garden and lends itself so admirably to artistic indoor arrangement is the salpiglossis. The seeds of these must be sown where the plants are to remain, for it is most difficult to transplant successfully. It grows to a height of about three feet, and may be had in a great variety of colors, and combinations of colors, including blue and gold, crimson and gold, and other beautiful combinations." King says this.
As a border plant, the salpiglossis flower bowl arrangement, the Calendula, in the many up-to-date forms, is ideal.
Gaillardias are easily grown because they are not particular as to soil or climate, and their bloom is very floriferous, and are very adaptable to the building-up of bouquets.
"For background stateliness, and indoor gracefulness, the lovely annual Larkspare find no peer. They grow to a height of three to four feet, and the long willowy branches lend themselves in delightful fashion to large vase or bouquet arrangement for the interior," the local nurseryman concluded.

A Jersey bull bawled a bass greeting to the 150 members of the Torrance Men's Bible class when they met at the Quandt Ranch near Redondo Beach Friday night for a real old-time Wild-West show and stag party.
Charles H. Quandt and his sons, Lewis and Carl, were hosts to the visiting class and they had, as assistant greeters, the aforementioned Jersey bull and a herd of heifers. The Quandts ushered their guests into a corral. The heifers ushered them out, via the nearest fence.
The cow, every one of them with horns according to Vern Zuber, were stamped in the direction of the incoming guests who made a hurried exit over the fences. Zuber, according to authentic reports, "stood not on the manner of his appearance," but went headfirst. Rev. George Elder was equally as graceful in his dive, it is alleged.
