### Abalone Violators Haled Into Court

LOMITA.—Ignorance of the fish and game laws brought 10 defendants into Judge Dennis' court Wednesday morning on charges of illegal possession of abalones, possession of undersized abalones and more than the limit. For the information of abalone fishers, H. Eschelman warns fishers that not more than 10 abalones may be taken in one day, nor more than 20 in one week, and that black abalones must be five inches or over in length and pink abalones over six inches.
