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### Quarterly Report By Studebaker Reveals Third More Profits

The net profits of the Studebaker Corporation and subsidiary companies, after reserves for Pierce-Arrow minority stockholders' interest, for the quarter ending June 30, 1931, were \$1,219,608.30 as compared with \$915,274.96 last year, a gain of \$304,333.34, or 33.3%. The amounts remaining for Studebaker Common, after preferred dividends, were 56c per share this year as against 41c last year, according to A. R. Erskine, president.  
 Net profits for the first half were \$2,029,354.97 this year as compared with \$2,258,702.17 last year. These provided 91c and \$1.03 respectively for the common stock. "Sales in units were larger in the second quarter than they were last year, but the amount of sales was 15.6% less. This means, of course, that our ratio of net profits to sales was considerably better in the current quarter, the result of economies effected in the meantime. In addition, larger reserves and absorptions were deducted from earnings this year," Erskine said.  
 The financial position of the corporation as of June 30, shows substantial improvements since January 1 in quick assets, working capital, and in reductions of property investment account, current liabilities, minority stock interest, and Studebaker, preferred stock. Working capital was increased to \$21,484,974.79 from \$19,438,646.00, with a ratio of quick assets to current liabilities of 568%, the best in 15 years, and an improvement of 100% from January 1, 1931. All bank loans were paid off during the period.

### Negro Servant, 102, Recalls Shooting of Pres. Lincoln

CARSON CITY, Nev.—Intimate memories of service with President Lincoln and his assassination were vividly recalled today by "Uncle Billy" Lynch, who recently celebrated his 102nd birthday here.  
 "Surely do remember that day and night—was right there when Mr. Lincoln was shot. That day Mr. Lincoln, he asked me to get some tickets for the show at Ford's theater. When I came back he thanked me, like he always did, and told me to brush his clothes most careful.  
 "Times Was Bad"  
 "That night he asked me and asks me to tie his tie, black one, like he always wore. He says to me: 'Billy, no use comin' to work early in the mornin', 'cause I don't think I'll be comin' down very early. I know I'll be late, so take your time.'  
 "First time he ever said anything like that, and he looked so solemn-like it sort o' scared me. He looked awful pale and sad, but he always looked sad those days. Times was bad.  
 "Us colored boys knew there was plots to kill Mr. Lincoln and Mr. Grant and all them big men, but we hoped nothin' was goin' to happen. Well, that night Mr. Lincoln and Mrs. Lincoln and an army majah man and another lady went to the show and sat in that box I got. Me and another colored boy went to the show, too. We sat in the gallery, where we could see Mr. Lincoln and his folks.  
 "Describes Tragedy  
 "While we was watchin' the show a pistol shot sounded. Then a man came out to the edge of the box. He had a big knife. The majah grabbed him, but he cut the majah, then jumps to the stage. But he caught his foot in a flag and fell. It hurt him, 'cause he went a-limpin' across the stage.  
 "Me and my friend ran into the street, and purty soon they brought Mr. Lincoln out, but they never let me see him. Next mornin' he died."  
 "Uncle Billy, still hale and hearty despite his 102 years, explained that he has lived so long because he has never worried, never hurried, and because he gets out in the sun every day to limber up his ancient joints.
