GRUBBS WILL EXHIBIT FINE BIRD DISPLAY

Collection To Be On View At Meat Market On Carson Street Next Week

Next week when Henry Grubbs, well-known proprietor of the Supreme Market at 1929 Carson street and Otis Market at 1639 Cabrillo avenue, places a fine display of mounted wild birds on exhibition at his butcher market on Carson street, he's going to be kept busy answering the question: "Where did you bag 'em?" But Grubbs, who returned this week from an extensive vacation trip to South and North Dakota and Minnesota, will explain the collection like this: "While visiting an old friend in Ellendale, South Dakota, Grubbs admired the fine array of mounted wild birds which were trophies of this friend's hunting trips in that state. As result of the Torrance man's interest, the friend presented him with a number of the birds. Grubbs expects to receive them by express this week and next week he will place them on display in his shop at the Meats Market. Among the mounted specimens are a bald-headed eagle (which is not bald-headed, at all); a male and a female pheasant, white owl, prairie chicken and other species of wild avian life."
