And about this business of eight hours' sleep a night, there's nothing to it, says Prof. Slaght. Sleep is a mental condition, and a man needs only as much as he thinks he needs.

Chapter No. 4 of the Poultrymen's State-Wide Protective Association will have an election of officers at a meeting to be held August 11 at 7:30 p. m. in Veterans Hall, Lomita.

"One big way for people to help this industry is to demand products made from good eggs. Poultry producers can solve their troubles if they will get together and do it, just as other lines of business are doing."
