That thought came to me as I visited our local library, fresh from a visit with a friend who told me marvelous tales of a trip on the Mediterranean. Why re pine that we haven't money for foreign travel when the greatest minds in the world are waiting to entertain and instruct us here? Someone has said that books are light-houses on the great sea of time, but I like best of all the sentiment in the bookplate in my grandfather's books, all over a hundred years old.

"John Paddock—his book, God give him grace therein to look;

Not only to look but to understand;

For learning is better than house or land;

When land is gone and money spent,

Learning is most excellent."

The finest articles on subjects of today, the latest and best fiction is yours for nothing if you will walk down to the library. The list of splendid magazines is far too poorly patronized. Here, every month come the Bookman, the Atlantic Monthly, Harper's, Good Housekeeping, National Geographic, American, McCall's, Ladies Home Journal, Collier's, News Review, Woman's Home Companion, California Arts and Architecture, Popular Mechanics, Popular Science Monthly, St. Nicholas, Boys' Life, Nature, Western Journal of Education.

Then turn to the bookshelves. What do you want—fiction, religion, philosophy, psychology, sociology, biography, or are you more interested in useful arts, or bee culture, or goat or chicken raising?

Are you gloomy over hard times? Do you think you know what hardships are? Read something about pioneers, such tales of heroism as Rolvaag's "Giants in the Earth"; "A Lantern in Her Hand" by Aldrich; "Early Candlelight, Lovelace; "A Labrador Doctor," by Wilfred Thomason Grenfell.

Plans are being made for a Community church school picnic which will be held all day Saturday, August 29, at Banning Park.



ery of all kinds, under a lease from the owner, Robert Nuckles. Petremont and B. W. Sunde are partners in the concern with Petremont, who has been in Torrance for three years, active manager. The firm represents an investment of about \$16,000 and has been doing that amount of business per year ever since it located here.

No insurance carried.

"The fire set us back six months to a year," Petremont stated. "It started on the northwest corner of the building. We have not had a fire inside the plant in months. But we are not going out of business and are now looking around Torrance for a suitable location. I plan on building the Chamber of Commerce in the hunt for a building. Mr. Sunde, who is associated with me, was a resident of Torrance for 10 or 12 years up to a year and a half ago, when he moved to Long Beach."

The firm expects to salvage between 25 and 30 per cent of the damaged machinery, according to both Petremont and the fire department here. No insurance was carried on either the building or equipment.
