## Mme. Billini, Noted Concert Pianist, Is Opening New Season

Mme. Teala Billini (Elsie Teal) well-known concert pianist and teacher, announces the opening of seasons 1931-1932. Mme. Billini has her studio in Torrance at 1304 Portola avenue, and in Los Angeles at 847 1/2 South Burlington avenue. Mme. Billini is known as an unusually successful teacher of pupils from beginning to the concert stage. To her beginners she brings the results of fourteen years of teaching experience, of five years of teacher training under Julius Hart, internationally-known pedagogic, and to her advanced pupils she brings 16 years of actual concert experience, having started both teaching and concert appearances in her early teens. Mme. Billini has concentrated extensively throughout the east, making her New York debut at Aeolian Hall in 1920. She was on the faculty of the Julius Hart School of Music for five years, being Mr. Hart's assistant for three years. Since coming to California, seven years ago, she has established herself as a concert pianist and teacher throughout the Southland. She has conducted master classes at St. Mary's Academy, seasons 1928-1929, and has maintained a Los Angeles studio since 1928. Mme. Billini's work has been praised by well-known musicians and educators of the Southland, among them John Smallman, L. Behymer, Max Swartout, and Dr. Rufus von Klein Smid of U.S.C., Frank Coby of the Pacific Coast Musician and many others of equal repute. In the study of piano with Mme. ## Economists See Wage Slash Due In Steel Plants

The question of wage rates is occupying almost the undivided attention of leading steel authorities and there is a likelihood that an announcement of a reduction of 10 to 15 per cent may be made in the not distant future, according to Daw, Jones and Co., well-known New York firm of statisticians and business economists.

"While some interests in the industry still hope to be able to avoid making a cut in wages," the Daw, Jones report stated, "there is a growing feeling that economic conditions will necessitate the action. This would bear out the contention of those who have been arguing for several months that a general reduction in wages is needed to bring costs down to a point where the leading companies can make some kind of a showing in net on the amount of gross business transacted."

It will be remembered that the United States Steel Corporation recently instituted a cut in the salaries of all office workers but made no mention of a reduction in laborers' salaries at that time.
