More Jobs Reported Filled As Statistics Bureau Issues Data

There is a definite upward trend in employment in California, according to the report of the state division of labor statistics and law enforcement.

In a survey of 1,164 identical representative manufacturing establishments throughout the state, it is revealed that 179,589 persons were employed during August as compared to the July total of 160,370, an increase of 12 per cent.

The totals of the weekly payrolls for the same establishments were \$4,092,572 in July and \$4,523,851 in the following month, the division reports. The increases are due primarily to increased activities in the foods, beverages and tobacco industries.
