No Aliens To Be Employed By Schools

All aliens now in the employ of the Los Angeles city school district will be dismissed from service and vacancies shall be filled by American citizens, according to instructions issued this week from Superintendent Frank A. Bouelle's office.

In his communication attention was directed to the school code of California which bars all aliens from public service, and pointed out that it is unlawful to employ persons other than citizens in any department of the state, county, or city government.

"In all instances where American citizenship cannot be fully established, steps should be taken at once to terminate the services of such persons, no matter in what capacity employed," the communication from the board of education reads.

The only exceptions to the prohibitions of the school code specified includes the employment of those who have declared their intention to become citizens, provided naturalization is secured within six months after the time permitted by law. A native born woman in the United States, married to a foreigner, may also be given employment. This law does not apply to college faculty members, or to any specialist or expert temporarily employed by any department, or to an emergency when it is necessary to protect health, life or property.

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Police Dog "Loses" Baby In Barren Part of Palos Verdes

A baby girl, less than two years old, accompanied only by a disconsolate police dog that seemed to know he had lured his little mistress to her plight, was found about 4:30 yesterday afternoon in a barren part of the Palos Verdes Hills by Mrs. Ed G. Skinner of Lomita.

Attracted by the child's crying which sounded "more like a coyote's or wildcat's cry than a baby's," Mrs. Skinner went to a neighbor's house to find out if they had heard it. Together, the neighbor and Mrs. Skinner swept the adjoining hills with a pair of field glasses—and located the forlorn wail.

Identified by Newsboy

Shortly after the tiny wanderer and her dog were taken to Mrs. Skinner's home on Hillcrest avenue off Canyon Drive, Bobby Barker, a newsboy, identified the dog and child. He said that the child's parents resided on 261st street, several blocks from where the baby was found, and that the dog was owned by the people who lived next door. The boy volunteered, Mrs. Skinner said, to take word to the parents that the baby had been found.

"When they arrived they were so excited that I did not learn their name—so all I know is that they missed the baby shortly after noon and had been searching frantically for her. They told me that the dog and baby were inseparable and believed that the dog had wandered off with the child following," Mrs. Skinner said. Later it was learned that the little girl's name was Mary Lois O'Neil.

The region where the baby and dog were found is uninhabited, being located in a wash. It is likely that even the field glasses used by Mrs. Skinner and her neighbor would not have picked out the lost pair if the child had not been wearing a red sweater. Mrs. Skinner reported that the youngster was severely bruised from tumbles taken on her journey and was almost exhausted from her long wandering and crying.

Utility Plans To Spend 11 Million During This Year

Expenditures in excess of \$11,000,000 will make up the capital budget of the Southern California Edison Company Ltd. for 1932, according to a statement made by R. H. Ballard, president, in announcing the company's general program for the new year.

"Conforming to the program which we laid down for ourselves, two years ago, better than 50 per cent of our capital expenditures for 1932 will be used for the building up of distribution lines and substations," Ballard said. "Our generating capacity of 1,258,000 horsepower in water power and steam generating plants and major transmission lines are adequate to take care of the needs of Southern California at the present rate of growth for some years to come, and it is therefore only necessary for us to further develop the network of service lines throughout our territory."

To Enlarge Substations

The total sum to be spent for distribution lines and substations is \$7,925,000, which makes up the largest single item of the \$11,997,000 budget. A sum of \$1,822,000 has been set aside for the construction of transmission lines and an additional \$333,000 will be used in construction and enlargement of transmission substations.

"While no new hydraulic generating plants are contemplated, a total of \$181,000 has been appropriated for miscellaneous improvements and betterments necessary around the major hydro-electric plants. A total of only \$41,000 has been appropriated for additions and betterments at the 600,000 horsepower Long Beach steam plant."

"In keeping with a new policy of the company, \$297,000 has been set aside for the purchase of land for and construction of commercial offices. The transportation department of the company will spend approximately \$159,000 during 1932 in the maintenance of garage equipment and for the purchase of new rolling stock as needed."

Figueroa Opening and Widening to 153rd is Assured This Month

With actual plans ready to be submitted to the Los Angeles board of Public Works, the opening and widening of the missing link on Figueroa boulevard between Manchester and 53rd street (Riverside-Rendon boulevard) is assured sometime this month, according to information from Los Angeles Councilman A. D. Hemming this week. All but \$4000 has been sold of the \$160,000 bond issue for the work, he reported.

The money made available through the sale of the bonds will complete the necessary funds for the acquisition of land needed in the improvement and will clear the last obstacle from Los Angeles' path for the making of Figueroa one of the finest arterial boulevards in the southwest.

8 Cadets Win Rifle Awards

U. S. Army Medals Will Be Given T. M. A. Boys

James H. Ego, 11-year-old cadet at the Torrance Military Academy, will be awarded a regulation U. S. Army sharpshooter's medal in the near future for his prowess on a rifle range with a standard U. S. rifle. Col. Robert L. Ingersoll announced yesterday. Ego, who is from Sacramento, qualified for the award recently by scoring 190 points at the Pasadena police range.

The following cadets will be awarded U. S. Army marksmanship medals, having scored the number of points after their names: William Thelen and Dwight Carroll, 191; Ellwood A. Sher and Charles F. Hildebrandt, 193; Julius Oehl, 192; and Jackie Fraser and Chadwick Shaw, 131.

Colden, former Los Angeles city councilman and past president of the Los Angeles Harbor Board. Colden, who is familiarly known as the "father of Los Angeles Harbor," will announce his candidacy for Congress from the 17th District.
