The state of California, through its free employment offices, found jobs for 152,734 men and women during the last 17 months.

This was the report to Governor Rolph by Will J. French, director of industrial relations, this week. Last month Los Angeles headed the list of free placements with 2,461, San Francisco following with 1,054, and Berkeley registering 825. Berkeley outdistanced all branch offices apart from the two metropolitan areas for the month, French said.

## Junior College To Open Spring Term, Jan. 27

Los Angeles Junior College will open classes for the spring semester on Wednesday, January 27, although students desiring to file application for admission must appear at the school at a much earlier date, according to Kenneth M. Kerans, registrar.

The Subject A, or English examination, which all new students are required to take, will be given at 8:30 a. m., Saturday, January 16. Those who fail to pass the examination must take this course, which is a review of high school English without credit during their Freshman year.

January 20 is the final date for receiving the applications of new students for admission to the college. The applications must be accompanied by complete credentials showing work done in high schools or other colleges.

Old Students, Jan. 25  
All new students must report at Junior College for the psychological examinations at 8:30 a. m. on January 23.

Old students may register on Monday, January 25, and new students are asked to report for registration on Tuesday, January 26. Applicants whose names begin with letters of the alphabet from L through Z must report in the morning from 8 to 12 o'clock, and those whose names begin with letters from A through K should report on the same day from 1 to 5 p. m.

It will be almost impossible for those who have not completed registration by 5 o'clock on January 25 to obtain a desirable program, Mr. Kerans said.
