It was wash-day in the jungles of Western avenue yesterday and the 12 men who "blew into" this comparatively comfortable camp during the past few days were "hangin' 'em out on th' line."

"We gotta make the most of this sun 'cause it's a tough life for a bundle stiff when the rain is comin' down, fellas," one middle-aged man told a Herald reporter who visited the peaceful little settlement of "wanderers" yesterday.

During the reporter's visit he learned many things about this nomad, workless life. It may be workless, but it isn't worthless; it may be tough, but it has its attractions; it may be without law, but it isn't lawless, and it may be careless, but it isn't careless.

How Food is Obtained
 There in the jungles, as all such resting places are known to the men who, for one reason or another, frankly call themselves hobos, were men ranging from 25 to 60, some of whom must have been in the 60's. They come back from periodic foraging and work-seeking expeditions to lounge in the makeshift windbreakers around three or four fires and at night they sleep in nearby boxcars.

"Well, we've had breakfast—had some stew with coffee and some bread, and now—well it's just one thing after another, we'd better see what we can find for dinner," laughed one, who later said he had not worked for 11 months. He was a glazier by trade. He described how the food was rustled.

"We make the rounds of the stores, bakeries and cafes, both the housekeepers and the bell-ringers climbing their porches tryin' to sell 'em stuff. We managed to get a few pieces of meat—that is if too many haven't been in the markets, askin' for handouts before. The bakeries are pretty good about handing out bread. Sometimes, yeah, I might say a lotta times,

"JUNGLE" IS ONLY HOME OF WANDERING "BUNDLE STIFFS"

Makeshift Camp Visited By Herald Reporter Yesterday; Men Tell of Hobo Life and Philosophy

When they get together in such dumps—but from the time those women breeze in, until they leave the next afternoon there wasn't anything but parlor conversation."

"The 'bundle stiff's' here had scant praise for some well-known relief organizations—operating throughout the country; declaring that one such "helping hand" was selling wearing apparel and demanding two hours' work for a nickel dinner of beans and bread, or maybe just soup and bread. The reporter learned that the jungle residents here this week had not tried to obtain anything from the Torrance Relief Society.

A Hobo's Advice
 "These local relief folks are trying to take care of the families in their home town and I guess that's the right thing to do," said a man, who was a farmer in Kansas until he was broke. "I would advise any of them advise a young fellow—or a man of any age—to 'hit the road' and become a bum if he found himself out of work and no job to be had."

"No, fellas—don't do it. The first thing that happens is a blow to your pride—you'd hesitate a lot before stooping for a cigarette but on the street; you'd do anything to keep from asking for a dime or a few scraps of food—but you lose your pride—just like us—and then—well, the road's long and interesting but it leads no place. No sir, no place."

Owners Protest
On Mattoon Act
 Figueroa street property owners in this district are urged to attend a meeting next Tuesday evening, January 26, at 8 o'clock at the Keystone Chamber of Commerce office to discuss a safeguard against the Mattoon Act and the procedure under which the improvement of Figueroa to the harbor is proposed.

At a recent meeting of protesting property owners at the Hall of Records, they were assured by county and Los Angeles city officials of a temporary arrest of the Mattoon Act and a possible change to another improvement act whereby they may need necessary property to the county in exchange for the paving without assessment. This change, however, is reported very indefinite at this time as it depends entirely upon the agreement of all property owners to the plan. Tuesday night's meeting is expected to be worthy of every property owner's attendance.

STRANGE AS IT SEEMS
